University Faculty Senate Meeting Minutes November 13, 2017 EE 106, 1:00PM – 3:00PM

- 1. The UFS meeting was called to order by Dr. Kevin Wagner at 1:00pm. The meeting was held in room EE 106 on the Boca Raton Campus and was video conferenced to Davie (DW 108), Fort Lauderdale (HEC 608), Harbor Branch (LE 235), Jupiter (SR 200), and Sea Tech (ST 259)
- **2. With positive approval**, the Senate approved October 16th, 2017 UFS Minutes.

3. President's Report

- a. Dr. Kevin Wagner begins his report by amending the agenda to add Dr. Eric Hanne as a guest speaker. Motion to approve. No objections from Senate. **Approved by majority vote.**
- b. Dr. Kevin Wagner announces that the Book Committee has been formed and has already met on November 7th to discuss the memorandum and give advice to the Provost. The committee will meet once more before sending their recommendations to the Steering Committee.
- c. President Kelly will be the guest speaker at the December Senate meeting. Vice President Jeff Atwater will be the guest speaker at the January Senate meeting and will speak about the university budget and strategic planning. In addition, Head Football Coach Lane Kiffin will be the guest speaker during one of the spring semester Senate meetings as well as Police Chief Sean Brammer.

4. Speakers

- a. Dr. Eric Hanne, Associate Professor, Department of History
 - o Dr. Hanne presents on the Civics Literacy update.
 - Applicable Statute (Section 1007.25, F.S.) states (4) Beginning with students initially entering a Florida College System institution or state university in the 2018-2019 school year and thereafter, each student must demonstrate competency in civic literacy. Students must have the option to demonstrate competency through successful completion of a civic literacy course or by achieving a passing score on an assessment. The State Board of Education must adopt in rule and the Board of Governors must adopt in regulation at least one existing assessment that measures competencies consistent with the required course competencies outlined in paragraph (b). The chair of the State Board of Education and the chair of the Board of Governors, or their respective designees, shall jointly appoint a faculty committee to: (a) Develop a new course in civic literacy or revise an existing general education core course in American History or American Government to include civic literacy. (b) Establish course competencies and identify outcomes that include, at a minimum, an understanding of the basic principles of American democracy and how they are applied in our republican form of government, an understanding of the United States Constitution, knowledge of the founding documents and how they have shaped the nature and functions of our institutions of self-governance, and an understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases and their impact on law and society.

- Next, the Civics Literacy Faculty Committee Members consists of a Common Prerequisite
 Discipline Committee for Political Science and a Common Prerequisite Discipline Committee
 for History.
- Finally, the results from the committee on October 27th, 2017 were based on section1007.25, Florida Statutes, the jointly appointed Faculty Committee approved the following recommendations:
- Course options for students to demonstrate civic literacy
- 1) AMH X020, Introductory Survey Since 1877, modified to include approved course competencies for civic literacy (FAU AMH 2020).
- 2) POS X041, American Government, modified to include approved course competencies for civic literacy (FAU POS 2041).
- 3) A new course (course prefix and course number to be determined) that would be available statewide and would not be part of the General Education Core and would include the approved course competencies for civic literacy (Goal to have new course ready for Fall 2019; Working Group from Committee to develop course TBD).
- Course competencies and outcomes
- Understanding of the basic principles and practices of American democracy and how they are applied in our republican form of government.
- o 2) An understanding of the United States Constitution and its application
- 3) Knowledge of the founding documents and how they have shaped the nature and functions of our institutions of self-governance.
- 4) An understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation, and landmark executive actions, and their impact on law and society.
