

Access to Nursing Education: Programs

- Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN): 9-12 months;
 technical program practice under the direction of a RN
- Associate Degree Registered Nurse (RN): 2 years; community college program – technical preparation for acute care setting
- Bachelor of Science Degree RN: 4 years prepares generalist to work in a range of settings
- Masters Degree: 1-2 years post baccalaureate specialized advanced practice of nursing
- PhD: research/teaching degree


Highest Level of Education for Nurses in United States

Nursing education matters to patients

- Research demonstrates that the educational level of the RN staff in a hospital has significant impact on patient mortality, morbidity and safety.
- At a time when the nursing workforce is becoming less versus more educated – the evidence does not support this movement and nursing must act in the interest of patient safety.

The Aging RN Workforce

- Average age of RN workforce is increasing more than twice as fast as all other occupations in US workforce
- Fewer than 9% of the RN workforce is under 30.
- 13.5% of Florida RNs who are working are between 57 and 65 years.
- □ Florida is estimated to need 71,000 more nurses by 2010.

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FAU Baccalaureate Programs

<u>Traditional</u> – two years after first two years of general education & science

RN to BSN – concentrated one year program for graduates with Associate Degree in Nursing who are registered nurses (RNs)

<u>Accelerated Second Degree BSN</u> – for individuals with a degree in another discipline; concentrated 1 year program

There is a continuing need for nurses in the state of Florida....

.....but there are barriers to supplying the continuing need because:

- Nursing faculty shortage
- 2. Insufficient funding of faculty lines
- 3. Non-competitive faculty salaries
- 4. Limited clinical site availability.

The Nursing Faculty Shortage

- Average age of a nursing faculty member in the State of Florida is 46.8 years.
- For University faculty with Doctoral Degrees, the average age is 55.7.
- A shortage of nursing faculty has been identified as the #1 issue impacting program expansion in the state.
- 6293 qualified students were turned away in 2005
