Course Description

This course is an upper-level required course in the Bachelor of Urban and Regional Planning (BURP) and Bachelor of Urban Design (BUD) Programs within the School of Urban & Regional Planning at Florida Atlantic University. It is structured to help students understand why and how plans are made, the different scales and types of plans, how zoning regulations work, and the need for plans, zoning regulations and development approvals to all be consistent with one another. The course has four parts: (1) provide an overview of plans and plan making followed by adopting zoning regulations to implement those plans; (2) focus on the *natural* environment when making plans and zoning regulations; and (4) provide an overview of how planning and zoning works in practice (in the realworld) so, hopefully, all of these urban planning and design concepts come together into an unified understanding so you can get your first planning job.

Course Objectives Course objectives can be grouped into two categories: (1) to expose you to *content* – knowledge about plans, plan making and zoning regulations; and (2) to introduce you to the *critical thinking* skills needed to analyze planning, zoning and design issues and solve related problems.

Upon completing this course, you should be able to:

- Identify different types of plans
- Understand how to prepare different types of plans
- Identify different types of zoning regulations
- Understand how to prepare different types of zoning plans
- Understand how to prepare a staff report
- Recognize the economic, legal and political context in which plans and zoning regulations are made

Portfolio

FAU and the Department of Urban and Regional Planning have instituted a policy requiring each BURP and BUD student to maintain a portfolio of completed projects and

coursework. You need to keep the original copy of your writing assignments and put them in your portfolio.

Course Textbook and Readings:

There is <u>NO</u> REQUIRED textbook for the course. All other assigned readings will be available on-line and/or posted on Canvas.

Grading

The course includes a combination of lectures by the primary instructor, class discussions, and video documentaries. The course is an exercise in reading, thinking, and sharing ideas rather than passive listening. Students <u>must</u> read the required readings <u>before</u> class and participate in class discussions. The following grading system will be used to determine the final grade:

Final Exam:

The final exam will have both short answer and essay questions. The final exam will include materials covered in class and in the assigned reading materials. This will be an in-class exam completed on an individual basis.

Comprehensive Plan/Zoning Report and Staff Report:

You need to prepare a comprehensive plan/zoning report and a staff report illustrating how a proposed development project is consistent with the applicable plans and regulations. This will be completed in groups.

Form-Based Zoning Code and Plan/Zoning Code:

You need to prepare a Form-Based Zoning Code and Plan/Zoning Code to allow for a major redevelopment project and make a PowerPoint Presentation to the class. This will be completed in groups.

Attendance and Class participation:

Attendance will be taken at every class during the semester; attendance will impact your overall grade. If you are not able to attend a class due to medical emergency please notify the instructor as soon as possible. You need to demonstrate a proof of your absence from the doctor; otherwise you will <u>not</u> receive the credit for the missed attendance. Attendance is not limited to showing up in the beginning of the class, it also includes showing up on time and staying until the end. Together with attendance, participation is also important. Participation is engaging in class discussions and asking questions.
