Course Description

This capstone course is designed for economics majors in their last year of study. Students learn to explore and understand policies to address current economic issues. Through short analyses and longer written reports, the course helps students apply economic theory. The goal of the course is to improve students' ability to communicate their economic ideas through papers and presentations.

Instructional Method

The mode for this class is listed as primarily classroom. Because we will be doing group work in class, we will generally meet live. We will do some activities online and an occasional lecture might be delivered online.

Prerequisites/Corequisites

ECO 3101 and ECO 3203. 3 credits.

Course Objectives/Student Learning

At the end of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Research an economic topic.
- 2. Form an informed opinion on policies related to the topic based on research.
- 3. Communicate economic information through written and oral communication.

Introduction: Discussion board assignment given at beginning of course.

Attendance Policy: The course is a discussion- and group-based course, so attendance is required. Each class is worth 3 points. The maximum point total that can be earned is 80 (out of 84). However, missing the beginning or end of a presentation day class will reduce your maximum score by 3 points (one miss means only 77 points possible).

Articles: You will find and post articles on the topics covered in class. You will also comment on other students' articles.

Outlines: You must turn in outlines for your papers. These will be graded and peer-reviewed.

Position Paper: More will be given on the paper on a separate sheet. Every student must complete two papers in order to receive credit for the course.

Discussion of your paper: For one of your two papers you will do a brief presentation of your paper to the class discussing what you did.

Other: Other assignments will be assigned as the course progresses. If the full 20 points are not assigned, the points will be scaled up.

Presentation: You will be required to give a presentation at the end of the semester. The presentation will be worth approximately 60 points. You will have to turn in your sources and an outline, which will be worth another 30 points. The presentation will be between 8 to 12 minutes (depending on size of class) and be on the topic of your choice, but may not be a topic that is covered in class. Every student must complete a presentation in order to receive credit for the course.

Final: A short answer test will be given during the finals week.

Policy on Makeup Tests, Late Work, and Incompletes (if applicable)

Missing Exams (Final)

Exams can be made up, but (1) I will require an excuse written by a doctor or other appropriate person confirming the reason for missing the class, and (2) you must let me know by calling me prior to the exam. All work must be made up as soon as possible and no later than one week after the due date. Failure to call or verify any excuse will result in deduction of some or all points for the exam.

Late Assignments

Some assignments / papers can be submitted late, but (1) I will require an excuse written by a doctor or other appropriate person confirming the reason for missing the class, and (2) you must let me know by calling me prior to the assignment. If these criteria are not met, then the assignment will be docked points, if accepted.

Note: The intro, articles, comments, peer reviews are not accepted late because these are integral to the flow of class. These are also assignments that have a fairly wide submission window.

Outlines will only be accepted up to two days late.

Papers will be accepted late with penalties (unless excused). Penalties increase each day the paper is not turned in. Papers are not accepted more than a week late.

Policy on the Recording of Lectures

Because of a new Florida Statute in 2021, the following model language is suggested for inclusion in course syllabi, at the discretion of individual faculty:

Students enrolled in this course may record video or audio of class lectures for their own personal educational use. A class lecture is defined as a formal or methodical oral presentation as

part of a university course intended to present information or teach students about a particular subject. Recording class activities other than class lectures, including but not limited to student presentations (whether individually or as part of a group), class discussion (except when incidental to and incorporated within a class lecture), labs, clinical presentations such as patient history, academic exercises involving student participation, test or examination administrations, field trips, and private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the lecturer, is prohibited. Recordings may not be used as a substitute for class participation or class attendance and may not be published or shared without the written consent of the faculty member. Failure to adhere to these requirements may constitute a violation of the University's Student Code of Conduct and/or the Code of Academic Integrity.

Attendance Policy

The course is a discussion- and group-based course, so attendance is required. Each class is worth 3 points. The maximum point total that can be earned is 80 (out of 84). However, missing the beginning or end of a presentation day class will reduce your maximum score by 3 points (one miss means only 77 points possible). Any missed classes will result in zero points, unless due to verified illness or university absence (sports or other official activities). In this case, the average attendance points will be put in place.
