The concentration in British History builds on the unique expertise of FAU's history faculty and is particularly suited to those students who desire to learn about the background of many social, economic, political, religious, and scientific ideas and institutions that have their roots in British history. While the British Empire is nearly a distant memory, the impact of British culture on many parts of the world remains. Many of the internationally-recognized principles of representative democracy, scientific and technological progress, modern capitalism, religious toleration, and human rights and personal liberties, emerged out of a foundational British context. It is hoped that an in-depth study of the contested lineage of many of these seminal ideas and institutions will provide a more nuanced knowledge and a better understanding of their wider applications.

For this reason the British History concentration is broadly comprehensive and also includes opportunities to study the nation's broader influence beyond the British Isles themselves.

Upon graduation, all students who fulfill the concentration's requirements will have it noted on their official university academic transcript.
