This project builds upon over a decade of research on agrarian movements in Colombia, demonstrating how the country’s coffee producing farmers transformed from being a labor aristocracy that divided the country’s agrarian

movement during the postwar developmental decades into one that united the country's producers to challenge the imposition of the neoliberal model. I plan to begin working on this book manuscript once the *Trajectories* book is accepted.
