Students can earn proficiency for a first-level course by successfully completing a second-level course. CLEP exam credits fulfill this requirement: see catalog.

**MAJOR COURSES, ELECTIVES, AND COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS**

**ELECTIVES** (37 credits, 12 or more classes) *Out of College Recommendations can count as elective credit*

— Free Electives - in any college or subject, including Social Science (38 credits) - *needed to meet the 120 credit minimum for the degree*

**SOCIAL SCIENCE** (39 credits minimum beyond those required in Core Curriculum) - 39 credits in Social Science - **(C OR BETTER REQUIRED IN ALL MAJOR COURSE)**

Complete a minimum of 39 credits in the social sciences, from at least three different disciplines, Two of these disciplines must be from the following departments: Anthropology, History, Political Science, or Sociology. Courses from the Departments of Economics, Geography and Geology (only courses in Geography can be approved), and Psychology may also be accepted with permission of an advisor.

1. Of these credits, a minimum of 6 credits must be in research methodology courses.
2. No more than 15 credits may be taken in a single discipline as credit for the major
3. At least 30 credits must be taken in upper division courses.
4. All courses must be passed with a grade of "C" or higher.
5. Credits used to fulfill the general education social science requirement may not be used to fulfill the major requirements.
