1. Have a minimum GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale on the general education component of undergraduate studies.
2. Complete or satisfy all CLAS requirements.
3. Pass all sections of the General Knowledge (GK) test.
4. Meet the general university requirements for admission.
5. Make a formal application to a Teacher Preparation Program in the College of Education.
6. Be approved for admission by the concerned dept. and the College of Education.
7. Be programmed before Spring of Jr. year by an assigned advisor.
