The College of Design and Social Inquiry has the following requirements: (1) 54 credit minimum of upper division course work, (2) a minimum of 'C' is required for each PAD prefixed course work (a grade below 'C', such as 'C-', will not count toward any portion of the required 120 credits). Students who come in with less than 60 credit hours must complete 9 credit hours of summer course work either at FAU or another SUS institution.
