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Course Description

A College of Medicine course in which medical student pursue directed independent study with faculty support and resources in preparation for the USMLE Step 1 Examination.

Prerequisite

Successful completion of all previous courses in the M.D. program

Course Objectives

1. Demonstrate the skills and habits of self-directed, life-long learning; self-assessment of learning needs and the ability to address those needs with appropriate materials and assistance.
2. Strengthen and integrate student knowledge in the pre-clinical medical sciences.
3. Scheduling of the USMLE Step 1 Exam for no later than 10 days prior to the start of Year 3 Synthesis and Transition (BMS 6405).
4. Demonstrate a commitment to ethical and professional behaviors in all activities and interactions with peers, faculty, staff, and the community.

Course Information and Schedule

The USMLE Step 1 Review Course is a 6-week independent study period designed to assist students in their preparation for the USMLE Step 1 Exam which students are required to take no later than (10) days prior to the start of Year 3 Synthesis and Transition (BMS 6405) in order to proceed with the Year 3 curriculum. Students will have completed an individualized study schedule with the Director of Student Success and Wellness and review sessions in pharmacology, anatomy, histology, pathology, and biochemistry prior to the independent study. Students will then use the 6-week independent study period to help strengthen and integrate their knowledge in the pre-clinical medical sciences in preparation for the USMLE Step 1 Exam. All students will be required to schedule their USMLE Step 1 Exam no later than 10 days prior to the start of the Year 3 Synthesis and Transition Course. All students will be required to submit an NBME practice test score to Dr. Lizotte-Waniewski at least one week prior to their scheduled examination date. Should a student fail the USMLE Step 1 Practice Exam or decide not to proceed with the Step 1 Exam within this time frame they must contact Dr. Michelle Lizotte-Waniewski and the Office of Student Affairs.

Students must refer to [OwlMed](#) for all up-to-date course information, schedules, handouts, objectives and content. Emails will be sent out during the year with any changes or updates.

Course Evaluation and Grading

The College of Medicine uses a competency based grading system based on Physician Competency Reference Set (PCRS) endorsed by the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) in order to ensure that teaching, assessment, and remediation of all competencies are equally prioritized. The eight major competencies focus on the following areas:

- Patient Care
- Knowledge for Practice (Medical Knowledge)
- Practice-Based Learning and Improvement
- Interpersonal and Communication Skills
- Professionalism
- Systems-Based Practice
- Interprofessional Collaboration
- Personal and Professional Development

Though these competencies were developed as a guide for clinical trainees and practicing physicians in personal and professional development as well as safe, equitable and effective patient care, it is important to begin using these principles in the very beginning of medical training as building blocks for a positive developmental trajectory.

The competencies assessed in USMLE Step 1 Review:

1. **Practice-Based Learning and Improvement**
2. **Professionalism**

Each student will receive a final grade of “Satisfactory”, “Satisfactory with Concern”, “Unsatisfactory”, or “Incomplete” in each of the PCRS competencies listed above, as well as for the overall USMLE Step 1 Review Course. A grade of “Satisfactory with Concern”, “Unsatisfactory”, or “Incomplete” in one or more of the competencies will result in that final grade being given for the overall USMLE Step 1 Review course. Details of how grades will be determined in each competency is described below.

1. **Practice-Based Learning and Improvement:** Demonstrate the ability to investigate and evaluate one’s performance, to appraise and assimilate scientific evidence, and to

continuously improve performance based on constant self-evaluation and life-long learning.

This competency in the College of Medicine's USMLE Step 1 Review Course will focus on the student's ability to:

- Identify strengths, deficiencies, and limits in one's knowledge and expertise
- Set learning and improvement goals
- Identify and perform learning activities that address one's gaps in knowledge, skills, or attitudes
- Use information technology to optimize learning
- Demonstrate the ability to learn independently
- Develop critical thinking and reasoning skills
- Display initiative in pursuing the study of medicine
- Demonstrate flexibility and the ability to deal with ambiguity

This competency will be assessed by the Director of Student Success and Wellness based on how students' progress through the USMLE self-study process including performance on a mandatory USMLE Step 1 Practice Exam.

2. Professionalism: Demonstrate a commitment to carrying out professional responsibilities and an adherence to ethical principles.

This competency in the College of Medicine's USMLE Step 1 Review Course will be focused on the student's ability to:

- Demonstrate compassion, integrity, and respect for others, including faculty, staff, and other students
- Demonstrate accountability to others, including faculty, staff, and other students
- Demonstrate a commitment to ethical principles pertaining to the study and practice of medicine

This competency will be assessed by the Course Directors in all aspects of the USMLE Study period. Medical students, as future professionals, are expected to conduct themselves appropriately in *all* curricular activities, including classroom work, laboratory work, clinical experiences, and independent study. Fellow students, faculty, and staff will report any unprofessional behavior to the Course Directors who will track this behavior within this competency.

The professionalism of a medical student in the USMLE Step 1 Review period includes but is not limited to:

- Maintaining academic integrity and confidentiality on all exams and other assessments.
- Answering emails from Course Directors, faculty, and staff within 24 hours of receipt.

- Treating all others with courtesy and respect.
- Scheduling the USMLE Step 1 exam and submitting USMLE Step 1 Practice Exam results as instructed.

Performance Assessment

SATISFACTORY:

Satisfactory is a passing grade defined as follows:

Practice-Based Learning and Improvement: Demonstrating appropriate self-awareness as well as evidence based practice and life-long learning skills throughout the USMLE study period.

Professionalism: Displaying **no** behavior patterns or individual incidents (i.e. dishonesty or disrespectful behavior) which would prompt faculty concern for the student's professional developmental progress.

A **Satisfactory** in both USMLE Step 1 Review Course competencies will result in an overall grade of **Satisfactory** for the USMLE Step 1 Review Course.

SATISFACTORY WITH CONCERN:

Satisfactory with Concern is a passing grade defined as follows:

Practice-Based Learning and Improvement: Displaying marginal levels of self-awareness and marginal demonstration of evidence based practices and/or life-long learning skills that have not improved to an adequate level by the conclusion of the review period.

Professionalism: Displaying dishonesty or disrespectful behavior which would prompt concern for the student's professional developmental progress. Failure to schedule the USMLE Step 1 Exam or submit USMLE Step 1 Practice Exam results within the time frame prescribed.

A **Satisfactory with Concern** in any one of the USMLE Step 1 Review Course competencies coupled with **Satisfactory** grades in the remaining competencies will result in an overall grade of **Satisfactory with Concern** for the USMLE Step 1 Review Course as recorded on the final course grade report. The student will be placed on "At Risk" status and will be referred to the Student Competency Review Committee (SCRC) for remediation and support (see explanation of SCRC below).

Neither the grade of "Satisfactory with Concern" nor "At Risk" status will be entered into the student's permanent transcript and therefore will not appear in the MSPE. Because this grade designation is considered formative rather than summative, the grade will be listed as "Satisfactory" on the student's transcript and Medical Student Performance Evaluation (MSPE/Dean's Letter).

However, a repeated pattern of “Satisfactory with Concern” final grades or failed remediation in a competency of concern will result in referral to the Medical Student Promotions and Professional Standards Committee (MSPPSC) for review and possible consequences including further remediation, repeating the course/clerkship, repeating the year, being placed on probation, suspension, and/ or being dismissed from the College of Medicine.

UNSATISFACTORY:

Unsatisfactory is a non-passing grade defined as follows:

Practice-Based Learning and Improvement: Displaying documented, unacceptably poor levels of self-awareness, unacceptably poor levels of evidence-based practices and/or life-long learning skills that have not improved by the conclusion of the review period.

Professionalism: Displaying repetitive poor behavior patterns or an egregious single incident of unprofessional behavior (i.e. cheating), or a demonstrable and documented “lack of improvement” of behavior patterns previously addressed which would prompt deep faculty concern for the student’s professional developmental progress such that it is documented and reported to the Office for Student Affairs (OSA). Failure to schedule the USMLE Step 1 Exam or submit USMLE Step 1 Practice Exam results within the time frame prescribed.

An **Unsatisfactory** in **any one of the** USMLE Step 1 Review Course competencies will result in an overall grade of **Unsatisfactory** for the USMLE Step 1 Review Course. The student will be referred to the MSPPSC for review of the student’s overall academic progress. The MSPPSC committee will then make a determination by vote to either remediate a specific competency to the satisfaction of the competency director or require the student to repeat the course, repeat the year, be placed on probation, and/ or be dismissed from the College of Medicine.

All “Unsatisfactory” final grades will be listed on the student’s permanent transcript and a notation of the failed competency and the remediation plan will be described in the Medical Student Performance Evaluation (MSPE/Dean’s Letter).

Students with grades of “U” or “I” may continue in the course of study in a current year of study, pending action by the MSPPSC. Progression to a subsequent year of study with a grade of “U” or “I” will require specific approval of the MSPPSC.

INCOMPLETE:

A grade of **Incomplete** is given when a student, for reasons beyond his/her control (i.e. serious illness, family emergency), cannot complete required elements of the USMLE

Step 1 Review Course by the end of the semester, but receive permission by the Course Directors to continue study with an Incomplete (I) status for the course. **Incompletes** are not given in place of **Unsatisfactory** grades, nor are they given when a student misses a majority of the PT 3 coursework. A student who receives an **Incomplete** must work closely with the Office of Student Affairs and the Course Directors to complete required coursework. A formal plan (“Plan for Completing Course Requirements”), including the expectations for work to be performed, method of student assessment, and time period to make up incomplete course work, will be established by the course, clerkship, or competency director, the student, and his/her LCA. When completed, the course, clerkship, or competency director will report the grade earned to the Senior Associate Dean for Student Affairs and Admissions. A grade of Incomplete (I) will be removed and replaced with the final grade earned. The transcript will reflect only the final grade earned in the course or clerkship.

Students with grades of “U” or “I” may continue in the course of study in a current year of study, pending action by the MSPPSC. Progression to a subsequent year of study with a grade of “U” or “I” will require specific approval of the MSPPSC.

Medical Student Promotions and Professional Standards Committee

The Medical Student Promotions and Professional Standards Committee (referred to as the “MSPPSC”) is a standing faculty committee charged with the responsibility of making decisions in regards to the standards and procedures relating to student evaluation, advancement, graduation, and disciplinary action including dismissal. Academic and professional performance will be evaluated by a variety of methods approved by faculty committees governing the curriculum, described in each course or clerkship syllabus, and will include not only formal examinations but also assessments based on observation of student performance in lectures, examinations, laboratories, and all other clinical and academic settings of the University or clerkships.

Student Competency Review Committee

The Student Competency Review Committee (referred to as the “SCRC”) is a committee charged with evaluating the student’s competency-based performance and deficiencies and formulating a process of remediation and formative support which will be coordinated by, and in some cases delivered by, the competency director(s) in conjunction with course or clerkship director(s). The SCRC will meet monthly and be responsible for monitoring all active remediation and off-cycle students.
