III. Approve minutes from the September 10, 2014 meeting The minutes were unanimously approved by the council.

IV. Task Force on Graduate Student Life

- a. The committee is soliciting from the UGC any available resources that will benefit graduate students. Any wish list items the UGC representatives would like to mention should be forwarded to Dr. Peluso or Susan Fulks, who will forward them to the sub-committee conducting an inventory of current resources.
- b. IBM SPSS 22 and other virtual Apps are available to students for free on the FAU website. These resources will be posted in the next Graduate College newsletter.
- c. The Graduate College is partnering with the Office of International Student and Scholar Services (ISSS) to solidify PAR conditional admissions procedures. The issue was discussed at the 10/9/14 Graduate Associate Deans Committee meeting.
- d. GPSA is addressing student housing issues with the Task force on Graduate Student Life. Part time graduate students often do not enjoy all the benefits the university provides, such as use of travel funds for academic activities.

V. President and Provost Visit to Departments and UGC

a. Dr. Peluso reported that the President and Provost's meeting with the Counselor and Education Department was a positive encounter. He prepared a five-minute overview of the strengths of the department, which was shared with the President and Provost. The group also discussed some pillars of excellence that will help jettison FAU to national prominence while holding administrators accountable to their commitment to student success. The President and Provost will visit the UGC on 11/13/14.

- b. As the President and Provost conduct their visits, it is important that faculty articulate the needs of students and any solutions in support of graduate programs. Departments are encouraged to prepare a five-minute presentation with highlights to share with the President and Provost.
- c. A presentation by Dr. George Kuh emphasized high impact practices, such as tailoring/improving operational systems to achieve student success.

VII. Interim Graduate Dean's report

a. Council of Graduate Schools (CGS) – April 15 Resolution

The CGS gives students a deadline of April 15 to indicate their acceptance of any financial assistance, such as scholarships, fellowships, traineeships, or assistantships. Any acceptances in force after April 15 will be viewed as binding and both the institution and the student must honor the agreement. A copy of the Resolution or a link to the URL should accompany every scholarship, fellowship, traineeship, and assistantship offer. A link to the resolution will be posted on the Graduate College website. In the meantime, the university attorney will be asked to review the Resolution and provide legal guidance. The issue will be discussed again at the next UGC meeting.

b. Articulation Agreements

A Florida Department of Education spreadsheet shows the state colleges that offer baccalaureate programs. Some of these colleges are hosting recruiting events to allow

state and private institutions to attract undergraduate students. Graduate associate deans were asked to determine whether their colleges have any articulation agreements or letters of understanding with any of the state colleges and report to the UGC at the next meeting. A copy of the spreadsheet of colleges and baccalaureate programs will also be emailed to the UGC.

It was also reported that tuition rates are lower at the state colleges, which might attract more students.

c. Library requirements for manuscript copies

Now that students are required to submit their manuscript electronically, colleges may wish to revisit the requirements for submission of paper copies. The link to this information will be emailed to the UGC and the matter will be discussed further at the next UGC meeting.
