## **Civic Literacy Requirement**

Beginning in Fall 2018, students entering a Florida public institution as a degree-seeking student for the first time needs to demonstrate civic literacy through either taking a certain course (AMH 2020 or POS 2041) or passing an assessment exam. Beginning in Summer 2021, Florida Legislature amended the statute and now requires students to complete **both** a civic literacy course (AMH 2020 or POS 2041) and an assessment exam.

FLEX: Foreign Language Exit requirement of second semester foreign language proficiency needs to be met prior to graduation.

**NOTE**: Honors Seminars SHALL BE ACCEPTED AS MEETING THE GORDON RULE WRITING REQUIREMENT. See the University Advising Services Office for details

#### FRENCH MAJOR PREREQUISITES

Number of credits to satisfy the prerequisite requirement depends on the proficiency level of each individual student in the French language. Students with more than one year of a French language in high school who have not taken a college level French language courses or students who are Heritage/Native speakers of French language need to contact an LLCL advisor to determine appropriate placement. CLEP exam credits can be used to satisfy requirements for FRE 1120 and FRE 1121. FLEX requirement is being satisfied by completion of FRE 1121 or higher. Students who are LLCP: French Majors or who are considering majoring in LLCP: French are strongly encouraged to start taking French language classes in their first semester at FAU.

French majors with more than 30 credits are advised through the Languages, Linguistics, and Comparative Literature Department (LLCL) and are strongly encouraged to work closely with the LLCL Advisor and Faculty Mentor in that department when choosing major courses and electives. Due to the specifics of language majors, French majors with less than 30 credits may seek "major only" advising from LLCL Advisor in addition to required Freshman Advising. All course selections should be made in consultation with an advisor in the Languages and Linguistics and Comparative Literature Department. Students must get a "C" or above in their major courses, also 45 credits must be completed at the 3000/4000 level. All Incomplete/Non-Reported grades must be resolved prior to graduation term. Students can benefit from using their "Free Electives" to complete a second major or a minor in the Department of Languages Linguistics and Comparative Literature or another department.

**NOTE:** To qualify for a Secondary Teachers Certification Program in French (K-12), students must do the following:

Make a formal application to program of Secondary Education, College of Education Admission Requirements

- Completion of 60 hours
- Enrollment in a BA in LLCP: French
- A minimum overall cumulative GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale on the general education component of undergraduate studies
- Passing scores on all sections of the General Knowledge Test (GK) portion of the Florida Teacher Certification Exam (FTCE)
