

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed for students who have significant experience in camera usage and processing along with developed critical thinking and writing skills. The class explores increasingly demanding projects that lead to a self- directed cohesive, polished body of work. Photographic history, contemporary image making, photographic theory and professional practice issue are also addressed. Access to camera is required.

RI DESIGNATION:

This course contains an assignment or multiple assignments designed to help students conduct research and inquiry at an intensive level. If this class is selected to participate in the university-wide assessment program, students will be asked to complete a consent form and submit electronically some of their research assignments for review. R. I. COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

KNOWLEDGE

Students will demonstrate advanced ability to integrate their technical skills, subject matter, and form to create conceptually grounded, research intensive photo-based works.

FORMATION OF QUESTIONS

Students will use the experiences provided through initial assignments, readings, and discussions to identify original research questions which will guide them in producing a unique body of photo-based work. This investigation will be guided by faculty supervision, providing the student with feedback throughout the process.

PLAN OF ACTION

Students will demonstrate the ability to take their individual research inquiries and break them down into actionable items moving from broad goals to weekly targets. This mapping will consider readings, written materials, resource management, and specific medium-based requirements. Faculty guidance and supervision will be provided throughout this process.

CRITICAL THINKING

Students will engage with and respond to their content from a critical standpoint. Evolving from surface level knowledge to a deep contextual understanding of how their research and execution must be married to create engaging work that is both contemporary and thought provoking. Critiques and guidance from faculty will be a keystone for the distillation and refinement of the student's work.

ETHICAL CONDUCT

Students will use their research as a basis to better understand the ethics concerning their relationship with society as an artist. This encompasses topics such as exploitation, appropriation, and culpability. These issues must be understood and dealt with to create work that functions as intended and progresses the student's goals and aspirations without unintentionally harming others.

It is strongly recommended that students complete the Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR) certificate through the CITI training of academic research on-line at <http://www.fau.edu/graduate/events/citi-training.php>. Students are also encouraged to attend FAU OURI workshops on topics related to responsible conduct of research. COMMUNICATION

Students will continue the long-held studio tradition of sharing finished works through open forum and peer critique. Students will compose and present a PechaKucha (20 slides with 20 seconds of commentary per slide) about their research. A preliminary version of this talk will be presented within the class, while final version will be presented during the final which will be open to the public. Students will also be encouraged to publish their outcomes via on-campus exhibition, such as the Juried Student Exhibition and BFA Exhibition.

Students will also complete the "Apply" assignment which requires that they research opportunities (with guidance from their professor) such as exhibitions, grants, publication awards, and artist residencies to submit their finished work to.

ATTENDANCE AND CLASS ASSIGNMENT POLICY

Attendance is required, all absences are recorded and there is no distinction made between "excused" and "unexcused" absences. Missing more than 2 classes will result in having your final grade reduced by half a letter grade for each subsequent absence. Arriving to class late 3 times will equal one absence. Perfect attendance or missing zero classes will be rewarded with 2 points added to your final grade.

Special exceptions, including religious observances and other exceptions that are officially recognized by the University, must be discussed and accommodated in advance on an individual basis with me. Only properly documented university approved activities, cases of documented illness, and observance of religious holidays will be accommodated. In the event of any absence, you are responsible for all material covered during the missed class period and any assignments that are given during your absence. It is your responsibility to read over the assignments/projects thoroughly (project sheets will be posted on Shutterfly), research the photographers noted, and ask any questions you have about the assignment in a timely manner.

Assignments are due at the beginning of class. Late assignments are penalized a full letter grade for each day late and will not be accepted after three days have passed. The final project will not be accepted late. If your assignment is not prepared, you are still required to be at the group critique. Failing to be present on a due date will hurt both your project grade and your participation grade. Critique days provide an opportunity for you to gain feedback and insight from your classmates and instructor. Likewise, it denies your peers your valuable voice and opinion if you are absent.

SUPPLIES

Student must provide their own DSLR, memory cards, flash drive, external hard drive, journal/notebook dedicated solely to this course, tripod, and inkjet paper (Epson, Canson, Moab, or Hahnemühle are recommended). You may work with digital and or analog equipment and materials. Additional supplies will be required based on the path you choose to take with the assigned projects. A flash, additional lenses, and a lens cleaning kit are recommended. Be certain to budget for exhibition expenses (such as materials and professional framing) for your BFA exhibition.

SHUTTERFLY

We will be using the online services of Shutterfly during this semester for assignments, readings, and image submissions. Your grades will be posted on Canvas or handed to you in class. On the first day of class you will need to open a (free) Shutterfly account and send a request to be added to our class page. Type <https://fauadvancedphoto2020.shutterfly.com> into your computer browser's address/URL bar. This will send you to the Shutterfly request page and will you be prompted to press the "ask" button. Once you do this, I will approve your request and you will have access to the site. Please use an email address that you check frequently.

The Shutterfly share site that the class will be using is a community website for this class and limited other faculty to use and view. You should not download, copy, or print any images that are not your own without express written consent from the photographer/owner. Any break in these terms will be considered a violation of copyright and will result, at minimum, in a failing grade.

I will frequently communicate with you via email and through our class Shutterfly site. It is a requirement that you check both daily. The FAU Studio Art Photo blog: <http://fauphoto.blogspot.com/> contains program updates, opportunities, internships, alumni news, student photographs, etc. Plan to check it at least once a week.

GRADING

Students should expect to spend a minimum of ten hours per week outside of class working on projects and assignments. This includes shooting, image processing, researching, and writing. The following will be considered when grading assignments: Aesthetics, concept sophistication, originality, experimentation, clarity, technical craft, adhering to project guidelines, submitting work on time and in full, and exploration of idea. The professor will make every effort to grade your work in a timely manner.

50% Projects and assignments

5% Submit work to be considered for a show, competition, or publication at least twice this semester. *

40% A final body of photo-based work, gallery ready, professionally presented, and accompanied by a written project statement.

5% Participation (in critiques, reading discussions, juried student exhibition, etc.)

*It is required that every student in Advanced Photography apply to the Juried Student Exhibition.
