STUDY TIP:

Auditing is a very different course from most accounting classes, requiring a lot of reading and memorization. My best suggestion for studying the course material is to read the chapters and test yourself multiple times using the homework practice quizzes.

Course Description

Why are audits provided by CPAs critical to the functioning of the markets? Audits provide accountability and assurance that managers fairly report in the financial statements the custodianship of resources entrusted to them. This course explains the role of audits in society, how audits are regulated, and the process that auditors go through to evaluate and communicate whether the financial statements are fairly stated. Emphasis is placed on integrated audits of financial statements and internal controls over financial reporting.

Course Prerequisites

Prerequisite: ACG 3141 and ACG 440

"According to Florida State Statute 6A-10.033, students must spend a minimum 2,250 minutes of in class time during a 3credit course. Additionally, students enrolled in a 3-credit course are expected to spend a minimum of 4,500 minutes of out-of-class-time specifically working on course-related activities (i.e., reading assigned pieces, completing homework, preparing for exams and other assessments, reviewing class notes, etc.) and fulfilling any other class activities or duties as required." Supplemental Course Description

This course covers the basic information to understand the role of auditing in society, the regulatory environment of auditing, how audits are planned an performed, and

- 1. Be able to identify the requirements and importance of audit quality and the contributions of an integrated audit and a financial statement audit to society, including to individuals, entities and the capital markets.
- 2. Understand the nature of the accounting profession, accounting firms and the services they provide, including the role

of ethics, auditor independence, legislative, regulatory and professional standards and effects of the legal system and courts.

3. Be familiar with audit planning, risk assessment, effective internal control over financial reporting including IT controls, audit procedures and audit reports, as well as the importance of industry knowledge on all of these topics.

The specific time required to make up an incomplete grade is at the discretion of the instructor. However, the College of Business policy on the resolution of incomplete grades requires that all work required to satisfy an incomplete ("I") grade must be completed within a period of time not exceeding one calendar year from the assignment of the incomplete grade. After one calendar year, the incomplete grade automatically becomes a failing ("F") grade.

Withdrawals

Any student who decides to drop is responsible for completing the proper paper work required to withdraw from the course.

Grade Appeal Process

A student may request a review of the final course grade when s/he believes that one of the following conditions apply:

- There was a computational or recording error in the grading.
- Non-academic criteria were applied in the grading process.
- There was a gross violation of the instructor's own grading system.

The procedures for a grade appeal may be found in Chapter 4 of the University Regulations.

Disruptive Behavior Policy Statement
