- Differentiate functions and responsibilities of inpatient and outpatient healthcare facilities and explain the importance of organizational patterns in carrying out their functions.
- Describe the various methods and patterns of payment for healthcare services.
- Explain the roles of government agencies associated with the healthcare industry.
- Understand the importance of ethics and law in health care delivery and research.
- Describe similarities and differences between care for physical and mental health in the U.S.

DETAILS

Attendance:

Students are required to attend all classes. Two unexcused missed classes are allowed per semester without penalty. For full credit during Zoom classes, cameras must be ON and students must be visibly present throughout the class period.

Flip Videos:

Each of the following discussions is worth six (6) points; each response to another student is worth two (2) points.

There will be two video discussions in this course, recorded on Flip. Your discussion should be approximately 2-4 min long.

NOTE: Each discussion also requires substantive video responses to TWO other students.

WHAT DO I MEAN BY "SUBSTANTIVE?" This means that they add to the discussion, carry it forward, and contribute new and meaningful content to the direction of the 'conversation'. Do not simply restate the thoughts of another student, or just say that you agree with what has been said. Your own words, not taken directly from the abstract or body of an article, or the wording from a web site, text, report or other source are part of the requirement for a discussion post entry.

Following are your discussion topics:

- **Introduction**: Students are expected to introduce themselves to your class members on Canvas using Flip. Record your introduction video. Your introduction must include:
 - your major, when you expect to graduate
 - your personal and/or professional interests in U.S. healthcare.
 - something that annoys you about our healthcare system.
 - one thing you would change about healthcare in the U.S.
- The Future of Healthcare: The final unit/text book chapter addresses the future of healthcare, a field of study that is always changing! Your report must include:
 - one prediction about healthcare for the future—changes in healthcare financing, insurance, new discoveries, technologies, etc.
 - Why you believe this will happen.
 - when you expect this prediction to take place. It can be a prediction you
 expect in the next year, the next five years, the next ten years.

Exams

Four Exams (15 points each; 60 points total)

- Exams will be available only on the days posted from 12:00 A.M. until 11:59 P.M.
- Exams will be based on readings and lectures, plus other course materials such as videos.
- Exams will include multiple choice, matching, and true/false questions.
- Exams will be taken online in the Canvas Learning Management System.
- Tests will be timed. You may not stop or pause. Once the allotted time as elapsed your exam will automatically be submitted.
- You MUST work on your own.
- No two students will receive the same set of questions.
- It is essential that you work in a space that is quiet with a RELIABLE internet connection. No make-up exams are allowed for technical difficulties.

Policy on Make-up Tests, Late work, and Incompletes

All students are expected to complete all assignments and exams on time. Instructors may at her sole discretion grant limited extensions of time for unexpected health or personal emergencies beyond the student's control. In order to be granted such an extension, the student must request accommodations prior to the exam or due date and the instructor may request documentation. For late submissions that have not been approved by the instructor the penalty will be a 10 percent reduction in the grade (on the hundred percent scale) for that assignment for each day that the assignment is late. No submissions will be accepted after grades have been posted for the class as a whole.
