Scott Lerner (Ph.D. Harvard) is Arthur and Katherine Shadek Professor of Humanities and French and Italian, Chair of Judaic Studies, and Chair of Comparative Literary Studies at Franklin and Marshall College. He is the co-editor of *Modern Jewish Literatures: Intersections and Boundaries* and the editor of *The Dreyfus Affair in the Making of Modern France*. His research interests include 19th-and 20th-century French literature and culture, Jewish identity in French and Italian literature and culture, intersections of psychoanalysis, critical theory, film and literature, and Italian studies.
