
Babylon Superman: Works by John Hancock

This summer, printmaking students in the Department of Visual Arts & Art History at Florida Atlantic worked closely with resident artist John Hancock, one of the Amazing Hancock Bros. The dynamic duo comprises of John and Charles Hancock, who are masters in woodcuts, silkscreen, and mixed-media printing. During his residency, students had the opportunity to learn techniques and skills in concept developments and execution while also exploring narratives for expression. In Babylon Superman, Hancock is providing his audience with "nocturnal transmissions via kosmik vibrations, dead poets, scotch, and chili dawgs."

SCHMIDT CENTER GALLERY



Curated in collaboration with the Shenkar Design Research Center, Common Ground explores three iconic landscapes of Israel as seen by designers. The selected artists lead us on a journey through time and space, juxtaposing contemporary and historical artworks in the Israeli grove, city, and desert. Each habitat invites us to explore the balance between humans and nature through tactile textile works, photography, and graphic design.


Rock, Paper, Chisel: Mixed Media Treasures from the FAU Collection



Based on Jane Caputi's, PhD, multi-year collection of presidential election merchandise, this exhibition examines the interplay of political media, consumerism, and patriotism. Presidential pop paraphernalia acts as a cultural fun house mirror, reflecting and reshaping America. Curator Lisa Rockford juxtaposes Caputi's mass-produced election materials documenting trends in American elections with artistic "craftivism" and flag iconography for insight into media in election times.



The NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt

In recognition of World AIDS Day, the University Galleries is proud to join Compass Community Center and its partners in displaying six panels from the AIDS Memorial Quilt. Considered the largest community art project in history, the 35-year old collective quilt commemorates those lost to HIV/AIDS with over 50,000 hand-sewn individual panels. Inspired by placards resembling a patchwork quilt created during Cleve Jones' historic 1985 candlelight march in San Francisco, the NAMES Project was first exhibited on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. in 1987.

DaVinci Genius: A.D. Henderson University School





The U.S. soldiers who helped defeat Nazi Germany and liberate the concentration camps were among the first eyewitnesses to the Holocaust. Remembering their stories of freedom inspires us to promote human dignity and confront hatred whenever and wherever it occurs. January 27, 2025, International Holocaust Day of Remembrance, marks 80 years since the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau. The Liberation exhibit, brought to the FAU Galleries from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in collaboration with FAU's Arthur and Emalie Gutterman Family Center for Holocaust and Human Rights Education, presents 21 panels of historical images leading to this historic liberation day.

South Florida Cultural Consortium: Mangroves to Masterpieces

The South Florida Cultural Consortium is a regional initiative in support of the arts in Broward, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, and Palm Beach counties. The Consortium works to foster cooperation across the South Florida region to help develop and promote the work of artists and the audiences that they serve. Each year, more than 300 artists who live and work throughout the five counties submit their applications for consideration to the SFCC's Grant for Visual and Media Artists. Curated by Veronique Cote from the 2024 winner of this prestigious fellowship, *Mangroves to Masterpieces* transports the viewer from the perceived notion that Florida is solely a tourist destination, into a deeper understanding of the cultures, contradictions, values, identities, and environments that make our state so interesting.

Dancing with Devils: Latin American Mask Traditions

Diablada festivals are among the most widely recognized celebrations in Latin America, with transatlantic roots tracing back to 15th century dances of the Moors and the Christians in the Iberian Peninsula. In this celebration, festive devils dance, play, laugh at authority, provoke, and taunt spectators dressed as multifaceted masked figures of Latin America's past and present. This traveling exhibition comes to us from the Ohio State's Center for Latin American Studies along with documentary photographs of the Diablada de Píllaro (Devils Dance of Píllaro, Ecuador) by photojournalist Leonardo Carrizo (OSU School of Communications). Also on exhibit are holdings from FAU's Department of Anthropology and University Art Collection, highlighting the University's research.
