The Jack Miller Constitution Day Essay Contest is an annual competition designed to challenge upper-division college students to analyze issues relating to the Constitution of the United States, confronting them in today's complex world. Students are encouraged to write thought-provoking, critical essays that raise questions, single out issues and provide rational arguments for the role of the Constitution in the civil life of the United States.

Contest Deadline:

Suggested Topics:

- Articulate with clarity a constitutional issue that you have encountered and analyze what it has taught you about the Constitution and yourself.
- Reflect on the relationship between ethics and the Constitution in today's world, making sure to draw on your own life as a guide.
- What does your own experience tell you about the relationship between citizenship and the Constitution?
- What does the Constitution mean to you in your everyday life?

Essay submission is open only to full-time undergraduate juniors and seniors at FAU. All submissions should be sent electronically to **Professor Clevis Headley, at headley@fau.edu**. Please include your contact information (FAU e-mail) when sending your submission.

All submissions to the essay contest are judged anonymously. A distinguished committee of faculty will review the essays and a jury will choose the winners. Please note that no manuscripts will be returned.

Winning essays will receive the following awards:

- A Certificate of Recognition issued by the Office of Undergraduate Studies.
- A \$250 stipend to purchase textbooks for Spring 2012.

The students whose essays are chosen as winners will read those essays on September 13, 2011, as part of that week's commemoration of Constitution Day.
