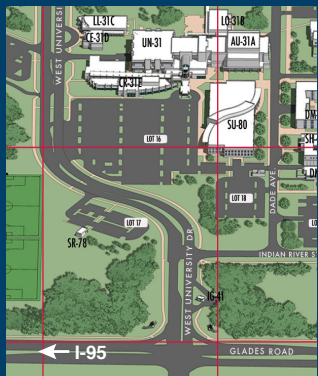


INFORMATION AND ACCOMMODATIONS

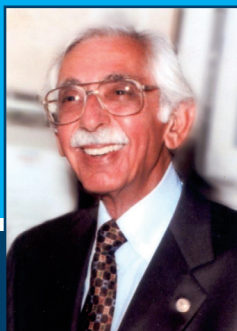

ABOUT THE SYMPOSIUM

ALAN B. LARKIN (1922-2002) made his living as the founder of the Larkin Group, a publisher of trade magazines for the fashion industry. His real passion, however, was American history, with a focus on the American Presidency. In his lifetime, he collected original signed letters from every American president, George Washington to George W. Bush.

The Alan B. and Charna Larkin Symposium on the American Presidency aims to keep Larkin's passion alive by annually exploring different facets of the executive branch and its significance to the American political culture. The symposium focuses specific attention on the role of the presidency in shaping diplomatic, political, cultural and social developments in American life.
