

On Tuesday, March 18th the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), in cooperation with the Comparative Studies Ph.D. Students Association (PSA), honored fallen U.S. military personnel and Iraqi civilians with its traveling exhibition: EYES WIDE OPEN: The Cost of War.

Over 170 pairs of combat boots representing the U.S. soldiers from Florida who have fallen in the Iraq War and 200 pair of shoes representing the Iraqi civilian casualties were on display on the free speech lawn on the Florida Atlantic University Boca Raton campus.
