Vice President for Student Affairs (fau.edu/student)

The Vice President is the chief administrative officer for Student Affairs throughout the University. Student success is at the heart of every program and resource this office offers. All of its programs, services and facilities are built around students, with the goal of helping them become active participants on campus and beyond. Dean of Students Office (fau.edu/dean)

The Dean of Students Office encompasses service areas including Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution; Victim Services, Respondent Services; and Case Management and Student Advocacy. The Dean of Students staff strives to enhance an inclusive, civil, accessible, and caring university culture through education on community standards, accountability for behavior, utilization of restorative justice practices and the offering of a wide variety of services. The team assists students with clearing barriers to success, finding essential resources and navigating university processes. The office facilitates the Exceptional Circumstance Withdrawal (ECW) process, the Homeless Verification process, the Admissions Review process, the Student Conduct Board, Dean's Certifications, the Student Crisis Awareness Committee, the Student Invention Team and the university food pantry program. While the Dean of Students Office is physically located at the Boca Raton campus, staff members are available to travel to satellite campuses to meet with students as needed.

Case Management and Student Advocacy (fau.edu/dean/our-services)

This unit of the Dean of Students Office is composed of non-clinical Social Work case managers who, provide students with guidance, advocacy, referrals, and coordination of resources (both on campus and in the surrounding community). The team assists students in navigating university services and in meeting basic needs related to issues such as food and housing insecurity. The staff work in partnership with multiple university offices to triage student needs related to mental health referrals, academic success and addressing of urgent basis needs.

Victim Services (fau.edu/dean/victimservices)

This unit of the Dean of Students Office is located in Wimberly Library on the Boca Raton campus. The Victim Services staff assists students, faculty, staff, and community members who may identify as a victim, whether the incident occurred recently, in the past, on or off campus. The Victim Advocates that comprise this team provide students with advocacy, reporting options, support, safety planning measures, resources and guidance in navigating university and criminal processes.

Respondent Services

The Respondent Services Coordinator is a member of the Dean of Student Office who assists students who have been accused of alleged infraction(s) of university policy. The coordinator acts as a guide to aid students in navigating procedures related to the investigation and adjudication of their case. This staff member also provides students with mental health referrals and other resources if additional needs arise during their involvement in these processes.

Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution (fau.edu/studentconduct)

This unit of the Dean of Students team oversees the Student Code of Conduct (Regulation 4.007) and offers educational and training opportunities to assist students in enhancing their conflict management skills. Utilizing best practices related to restorative transformative justice, educational learning opportunitiessanctioning and conflict resolution techniques, the office encourages accountability for actions while focusing on the restoration of any harm done to individuals and/or the community.

Weppner Center for Lead and Service Learning (LEAD) (fau.edu/lead-and-serve)

The Weppner Center for LEAD and Service-Learning focuses on empowering students' pursuit of their own developmental growth by cultivating lifelong leadership skills and engaging in experiential service learning to become more effective citizens in their community.

Lead and Serve provides volunteer opportunities through Days of Service to immersive alternative break experiences known as Owl Breaks, develops leadership workshops and conferences such as iLead and WeLead: Community Engagement Conference, and encourages students to be civically engaged by promoting voter engagement and democratic involvement. Students can also become ambassadors of Lead and Serve by serving on the Student Government's Students Advocating for Volunteerism and Involvement (SAVI) board or applying to become an Elite Owl, a premier leadership position at Florida Atlantic. Campus Life for the Davie, Fort Lauderdale and Dania Beach campuses is coordinated through the Student Affairs offices on the Davie campus.

Center for Global Engagement (fau.edu/global)

The Center for Global Engagement was established in 2016 as a hub for international activities and global engagement efforts and in support of the Global Perspectives and Participation platform of the university strategic plan. Reporting to the Provost's Office, the Center for Global Engagement focuses on developing, promoting, and advocating for global mobility, exchange, competence and outreach through a variety of programs and services across five functional areas:

Education Abroad (EA): This office coordinates long and short-term study abroad programming, manages the University's international agreements and partnerships, and represents FAU within the field of international education. FAU Education Abroad administers and oversees credit-bearing study abroad programming and provides support services to students engaging in University-affiliated travel abroad. FAU Education Abroad advises students and faculty on fellowship and grant opportunities for overseas study and research; it also coordinates activities for the Peace Corps Prep Certificate Program. Education Abroad activities seek to increase access to global engagement not only through global travel, but also through virtual exchanges and other opportunities that provide a global experience with or without the need for physical travel. The office coordinates the <u>FAU Global Tech</u> virtual experience, a credit-bearing option for students who wish to engage in global learning without traveling abroad. International Student Services (ISS): This unit provides visa/immigration support to all F and J international students and their dependents as well as assists them in transitioning to a new culture and educational system at FAU and in the U.S. They provide a multitude or programs and services, including (but not limited) to the following: F and J visa compliance, reporting, and record maintenance, including guidance and information for students and the university regarding immigration regulations and updates pertaining to student visas; services for newly admitted international students, such as issuing visa documents (I-20 and DS-2019), pre-arrival information, mandatory immigration orientation and check-in and welcome events; services for continuing international students such as maintenance of valid immigration status, employment regulations while in F/J status, travel/re-entry/visa renewal procedures, as well as extension or change of status procedures; preparing letters required for driver's license, or social security administration, providing general information about international student tax compliance, and serving as liaisons to government agencies as needed. ISS also provides support government sponsored students and manages foreign post-secondary transcript evaluations and degree validation information. Additionally, ISS offers a variety of programs aimed at supporting international student integration and cultural adjustment, such as welcome events, on-campus engagement opportunities, International Friends Program, Florida International Leadership Conference, global coffee hours, and more. International Enrollment Services: This unit is responsible for facilitating the application, admission, onboarding, and enrollment of high-quality international students who are recruited via our Study Group partner. From application to enrollment, we work closely with Study Group and university partners to provide holistic support to students throughout the process. Additionally, IES participates in international recruitment strategies and supports international alumni engagement.

Intensive English Institute: Established in 1995 and housed in the Center for Global Engagement, Florida Atlantic University's Intensive English Institute provides high-quality English language instruction to international and domestic students seeking to pursue an academic degree, professional interest or personal goal. Students develop linguistic and cultural competence through a comprehensive and innovative curriculum delivered by dedicated faculty. In addition, the Intensive English Institute offers a prestigious Bridge program which provides conditional admission to FAU degree programs. IEI also delivers instruction for the SITA (Seminar for International Teaching Assistants) program and provides a variety of custom and individualized learning programs for FAU, the local community, and global partners. Global Academic Services (GAS): This office supports international scholars, visitors, and employees who join FAU for research, teaching, consulting, and other international activities. The department provides regulatory and programmatic guidance for international scholars on J-1 visas (scholar, professor, intern, and specialist categories) as part of the U.S. Department of State Exchange Visitor Program. The office also promotes the Fullbright Scholar Program that offers FAU faculty grants to lecture, conducts research, or participate in seminars around the world. Further, we ensure compliance with federal regulations regarding the employment of foreign nationals on sponsored visas (H-1B, O-1, TN) and employment-based green card requests. Lastly, GAS serves as a liaison between the hiring departments and FAU contracted immigration firm. Our web site provides an opportunity to gain more information on visa sponsorship process. The Office of First-Generation Student Success (fau.edu/firstgen/)

The Office of First-Generation Student Success creates a SAFE (Sense of Belonging, Academic. Financial. Engagement) and welcoming environment for incoming First-Generation students. Our goal is to provide immediate connectivity to campus resources and to foster a community of support by helping to remove all barriers that prevent a successful matriculation from orientation to graduation within 4 years or less.

Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) (fau.edu/counseling)

Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) strives to provide FAU students with quality, individualized, timely and effective mental health services that allow them to improve and maintain their mental wellbeing. With mental health support, students are able to meet their educational, personal, emotional and psychological goals. CAPS offers individual, relationship and group therapy, referral coordination, consultations for students, faculty and staff, and daytime and after-hours mental health crisis support. Its professionally trained multidisciplinary staff is dedicated to assisting students with a wide range of personal and psychological concerns. The staff at CAPS provides a warm and caring office atmosphere where students can receive individualized, culturally competent mental health treatment. CAPS is a confidential space and information about students cannot be disclosed without their written permission or when disclosure is required by law.

Fraternity and Sorority Life (fau.edu/fslife)

Membership in a social fraternity or sorority is a great way to enhance your FAU experience. Collectively, fraternities and sororities constitute one of the largest student populations on campus. Fraternities and sororities are about lifelong friendships, scholarship, community service, leadership, and peer accountability. According to the North American Interfraternity Conference, "fraternity members are 20% more likely to graduate and first-to-second year retention rates among sorority members hit 93%". Many leaders of today, including those here at FAU, are members of fraternities or sororities. We're "more than letters, we're family", and we encourage you to explore opportunities to understand why membership makes our fraternity and sorority community so unique and beneficial.

Housing and Residential Education (fau.edu/housing)

Approximately 5,225 students live and learn in 11 residence halls on the Boca Raton and Jupiter campuses. Housing and Residential Education provides a wide range of programs, services, and

amenities designed to enhance the FAU experience and foster academic success. Living on campus promotes a sense of community among students, encouraging social interaction, collaboration, and the formation of lasting friendships. FAU's residential communities provide additional access to caring staff, study spaces, resources, and programming that helps students achieve their academic goals. In addition, the security measures, maintenance services, and staff ensure a safe and comfortable living environment. Housing is limited and in high demand. Owls Care Health Promotion (<u>fau.edu/owlscare</u>)

Owls Care Health Promotion (OCHP) empowers students to be healthy, responsible, and successful by providing wellness information, dynamic programs, and services on health-related issues such as stress management, healthy lifestyle, sexual health and well-being, substance safety, healthy relationships, and much more. These services enhance the health of our FAU community and increase opportunities for students' academic and personal success. Access to earplugs, eye masks, safer sex resources, and other self-care items is available in the Owls Care Office in SS 8-224 (top floor of the Breezeway).

As part of our commitment to your success, Owls Care provides the Fit First-Year for Student Success online training series to help you transition to college. Areas that may present challenges revolve around alcohol and your personal health and safety. Additionally, Financial literacy and career preparation require early attention in your college career. We offer these trainings to comply with the FAU, State of Florida, and Federal requirements. Not completing modules may result in your inability to register for classes for an upcoming semester. The team works towards providing referrals to services and resources as well as educational and social programs.

Student Accessibility Services (<u>fau.edu/sas</u>)

Student Accessibility Services (SAS) takes great pride in the academic and personal achievements of students with disabilities. Florida Atlantic University is committed to providing equal access for individuals with disabilities to all academic, social, cultural, and recreational programs. SAS is in compliant ice with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, and the Americans with Disabilities Act Amendments Act of 2008. The mission of SAS is to collaborate with the institution's diverse community to ensure that all aspects of campus life — learning, working, and living — are universally accessible. SAS is committed to providing quality and comprehensive individualized services and state-of-theart assistive technology while adapting to the dynamic needs of the diverse student population of Florida Atlantic. SAS works closely with faculty and staff to ensure that reasonable accommodations are provided to our students. SAS seeks to form collaborations that promote an inclusive learning environment for students, social, academic, and career success.

Student Government (SG) (fau.edu/sg)

Student Government is the official voice and governing body of the student population at Florida Atlantic University. Modeled after the U.S. government structure, Florida Atlantic University's Student Government has three branches: executive, legislative, and judicial. SG serves as one of the largest on-campus opportunities for student leadership, legislative action, lobbying, and advocacy for the student experience at FAU. SG also offers a variety of services which include research travel funding, test prep program discounts, parking citation forgiveness program, textbook discounts, food insecurity vouchers, as well as access to free scantrons and blue books to students weekly.

Student Health Services (fau.edu/shs)

Student Health Services (SHS) provides high quality, affordable and accredited healthcare to registered FAU students at the Boca Raton, Jupiter, and Davie campuses. Its student-focused services offer a primary care solution to both commuter and residential students. A student's health and the ability to thrive academically are closely linked. It is the goal of Student Health Services' dedicated team of professionals to provide caring, confidential health and dental care and credible health information to help FAU students stay healthy, graduate on time and establish lifelong health habits. Students who pay the FAU health fee are eligible for services and have access to self-pay discounts. No payment is required at the time of service; any charges will be sent to the student's account. Insurance is not required to use Student Health Services, but SHS is an in-network provider with a number of major insurances. Check the website for a complete list. Telehealth and in person visits are offered. Students can self-schedule appointments via the patient portal. Schedule an appointment today or stop in to visit the campus medical, women's health, nutrition, or dental (Boca Raton campus only) clinic.

Student Activities and Involvement (fau.edu/involvement)

Welcome to the Office of Student Activities and Involvement at Florida Atlantic University, where campus life comes alive! Our office is dedicated to enriching the student experience by providing a dynamic array of programs, events, and opportunities that foster personal growth, leadership, and community engagement. Whether you're looking to join one of our many student organizations, fraternities and sororities, participate in campus-wide events, or take on a leadership role, the Office of Student Activities and Involvement is your gateway to making lasting connections and memories at Florida Atlantic. Student Media (fau.edu/studentmedia)

The Department of Student Media provides learning opportunities in media that promote student participation and enrichment through the practice of newspaper, television and radio journalism. Led by professional advisors, those involved in student media can acquire real world experience in a living, learning lab to complement what they learn in the classroom. In addition to building resumes, student media offers a wide range of paid positions that allow students to focus on their academics while also committing time to producing journalistic material and building portfolios. Student Media hosts a number of events throughout the year, such as fall and spring open houses, Constitution Week, and a quest speaker training series. Students also attend regional and national college media conferences to present, compete and connect with media industry professionals. Students who participate in Student Media learn real-world skills in communication, production and other forms of media which they can later use to obtain an internship or job. From there, students in recent years have received opportunities

locally, including WLRN and the Palm Beach Post. They've also found work nationally at places like the Las Vegas Review-Journal, Investigate Midwest, and NBC.

Student Union (fau.edu/studentunion)

The Student Union is the community center for all members of the Florida Atlantic University campus including students, faculty, staff and visitors. The Student Union is an excellent center that contributes directly to the educational mission of Florida Atlantic University by providing encouragement and opportunities for participation in educational, cultural and recreational activities. The facilities provide a central place for students and others to spend time learning, socializing and relaxing while coming to feel more closely connected to the campus. The Student Union is is now the home of the new eSports Gaming Center, featuring which houses 40 gaming PCs computers, a console gaming area along with an area for billiards, foosball, air hockey and table tennis that all can enjoy. The Student Union provides a home for Registered Student Organization meetings and events including concerts, comedy shows, leadership conferences, and much more.

First-Year Connections mentoring program (fau.edu/mentoring; mentoring@fau.edu)

with the Davie, Fort Lauderdale and Jupiter campuses. Orientation for Wilkes Honors College students is also held in partnership with the Northern Campus Life Staff and Honors College Faculty & Staff.

Orientation Leaders support all New Student Transitions & Family Engagement Programs. They are dedicated, spirited, and highly trained individuals who ease the transition for incoming students and their families. By sharing their knowledge of campus resources and experiences at FAU, they support a smooth transition for new FAU students.

FAU's Student Code of Conduct promotes a safe and secure university community focused on civility, integrity, and personal responsibility. The code outlines procedures that provide fairness in the student conduct process and clarifies expectations related to student accountability. The code encourages the development of students as global citizens.

STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM FREE EXPRESSION STATEMENT

The State University System of Florida and its twelve public postsecondary institutions adopt this Statement on Free Expression to support and encourage full and open discourse and the robust exchange of ideas and perspectives on our respective campuses. The principles of freedom of speech and freedom of expression in the United States and Florida Constitutions, in addition to being legal rights, are an integral part of our three-part university mission to deliver a high quality academic experience for our students, engage in meaningful and productive research, and provide valuable public service for the benefit of our local communities and the state. The purpose of this Statement is to affirm our dedication to these principles and to seek our campus communities' commitment to maintaining our campuses as places where the open exchange of knowledge and ideas furthers our mission.

A fundamental purpose of an institution of higher education is to provide a learning environment where divergent ideas, opinions and philosophies, new and old, can be rigorously debated and critically evaluated. Through this process, often referred to as the marketplace of ideas, individuals are free to express any ideas and opinions they wish, even if others may disagree with them or find those ideas and opinions to be offensive or otherwise antithetical to their own world view. The very process of debating divergent ideas and challenging others' opinions develops the intellectual skills necessary to respectfully argue through civil discourse. Development of such skills leads to personal and scholarly growth and is an essential component of the academic and research missions of each of our institutions.

It is equally important not to stifle the dissemination of any ideas, even if other members of our community may find those ideas abhorrent. Individuals wishing to express ideas with which others may disagree must be free to do so, without fear of being bullied, threatened or silenced. This does not mean that such ideas should go unchallenged, as that is part of the learning process. And though we believe all members of our campus communities have a role to play in promoting civility and mutual respect in that type of discourse, we must not let concerns over civility or respect be used as a reason to silence expression. We should empower and enable one another to speak and listen, rather than interfere with or silence the open expression of ideas.

Each member of our campus communities must also recognize that institutions may restrict expression that is unlawful, such as true threats or defamation. Because universities and colleges are first and foremost places where people go to engage in scholarly endeavors, it is necessary to the efficient and effective operations of each institution for there to be reasonable limitations on the time, place, and manner in which these rights are exercised. Each institution has adopted regulations that align with Florida's Campus Free Expression Act, section 1004.097, Florida Statutes, and with the United States and Florida Constitutions and the legal opinions interpreting those provisions. These limitations are narrowly drawn and content-neutral and serve to ensure that all members of our campus communities have an equal ability to express their ideas and opinions, while preserving campus order and security.

All students enrolled in the University including all student residents, regardless of institutional or program affiliation, are expected to know and adhere to the regulations and policies of the University, as well as local, state and federal laws.
