Session Abstract: Effective differentiation of instruction for students with autism and related disabilities depends on flexible, accessible, and responsive instructional materials. Grounded in evidence-based practices for Universal Design for Learning (UDL), inclusive pedagogy, and assistive technology, the session highlights how AI tools can be used to differentiate instruction by adapting content, adjusting language complexity, providing multiple representations, and generating individualized supports aligned with students' strengths.
