

Executive Director's Message

Dear CARD Families,

Bullying of students with autism can take many forms, all of them bad. We see students physically bullied, punched, pushed around and even injured while others are subject to unrelenting emotional bullying from one student or even from groups of students. An increasing trend is for students to be bullied over the Internet or with their cell phones. Each form is harmful and makes the kinds of progress we hope for in social capacity so much more difficult.

FAU CARD staff have been busy recently hosting a series of three Anti-Bullying Focus Groups and two Anti-Bullying presentations. For the focus groups, we did one group in Delray, another on the FAU Jupiter campus and a third at the Indian River State College in Port St. Lucie. We invited students at the middle and high school levels who had been bullied and their parents to meet with us and discuss their experiences with having been bullied. We had a great turnout for each of these events. We divided the participants up into separate groups for middle and high school and then the parents into corresponding parent groups. We audio recorded the comments in response to a series of questions about their experience with bullying.

We did this for two purposes. First was to allow us at CARD to more fully understand what is happening in these bullying situations so that we can better support students and their families when a bullying situation arises. The second purpose was for research that we will share with the wider autism academic and intervention community. The information we obtained will help immensely in achieving both of these objectives. Right now, we are in the process of analyzing the many hours of audio taped material and pages and pages of notes.

We had two other bullying events. Dr Sameer Hinduja, a professor at FAU and internationally recognized expert on cyber bullying, spoke at the FAU Jupiter campus. Students using electronic media to bully each other has become, sadly, more and more popular. Parents should stay alert to what their children are doing with their phones and on their computers. On November 17, we had Dr. Susan Limber from Clemson University speak both at the FAU Jupiter Campus and at our Boca Campus. Dr. Limber is one of the top experts on bullying worldwide. She gave a great summary of how extensive bullying is and discussed some of the special problems it presents for students who are on the autism spectrum.

All of this and more was possible due to the generosity of a special friend of FAU CARD. I want to offer a special word of thanks to the sponsor of these events, Mr. Craig Donoff, an estate attorney practicing in Boca Raton. Craig and his family have been long-term supporters of our autism efforts here and we are very grateful to them.

Director's Update

Dear CARD Families,

We hope you had a smooth transition to the new school year. It is hard to believe that once again, we are approaching the holidays. It has been a very busy and productive fall at FAU CARD!

FAU CARD organized a very well attended **Transition Conference on Friday, September 30th**. The keynote speaker was Scott Badisch, President and CEO of the Autism Society of America. Scott shared from a professional and parent perspective, the importance of beginning the post-secondary education and employment transition process early. Additionally, Elsa DeGoias from Career Source; Joe and Craig Eppy, from the Eppy Group and Richard Friedkin from Gulfstream Goodwill provided an update on new initiatives at Career Source, and the importance of financial and benefits planning.

Through a generous donation from Craig Donoff, P.A., FAU CARD was able to bring Dr. Susan Limber to our community, to provide two presentations, one afternoon presentation on the FAU Jupiter campus and an evening presentation on the Boca Campus. Dr. Limber is a noted international authority on bullying and an Olweus distinguished award winning professor from Clemson University. Dr. Limber shared with the community a systemic approach to address bullying, supporting the targeted child, while instructing the bully.

We were also fortunate to provide a training on **Cyberbullying** by our own FAU Criminology professor and national expert in cyberbullying, Dr. Sameer Hinduja. Dr. Hinduja spoke to an involved group of professionals, family members and community representatives at the FAU Jupiter campus on September 28th providing an overview of cyberbullying, its impact and the innate vulnerabilities young people with autism experience.

In addition to the Anti-Bullying initiative and research, FAU CARD launched its **Little Owls Comprehensive Parent Training Program** for parents and caretakers of young children recently identified with autism or in the diagnostic assessment process. The Little Owls program is a three-day parent training program offered through a generous gift from the Taft Foundation. The program provides parents with strategies for dealing with challenging behaviors, tips for enhancing social communication, advocacy, resources, benefits and more. I am happy to share that the Mangurian Foundation again funded FAU CARD for the **Autism Community Speakers Series**. TIPS FOR A MORE ENJOYABLE FAMILY GATHERING

As we approach the holidays, many families will be having gatherings and celebrations. Family gatherings are exciting, but for families of children on the autism spectrum it presents special challenges as their daily routine is disrupted. These gatherings may be stressful, as they may have a hard time processing loud sounds or being in crowded areas. Below are a few tips to help guide you through the holiday season to help make it a more joyous family gathering for the person on the autism spectrum.



- 1. **Create a schedule.** A schedule of activities will provide predictability in this setting. Let your child know what the day will look like, and when it will be time to go home.
- 2. **Find a quiet space for the child to retreat.** Try to find a quiet space in the home where your child can go if they need to leave the area. Take familiar toys and activities with you that you know will help soothe them.
- 3. **Review the rules of visiting other homes.** If there are certain rules you need your child to follow while at someone else's house, let them know what these rules and expectations are ahead of time. You can also practice following these rules ahead of time. If you know there may be expectations that are more challenging for your child, ask your BCBA to work on these skills with you and your child in the weeks leading up to the holiday gathering.
- 4. **Create a Social Story for your child.** Social Stories are to help teach social skills to people on the autism spectrum. They are short descriptions of a particular situation, event, or activity, which include specific information about what to expect in that situation and why. These are another great way to prepare your child for the Holiday gathering to let them know what they should and should not do at a guest's house, or when they have company at their house. These stories can be made on the computer, or they can be hand written and drawn.



Executive Functioning

This training will cover the basics of Executive Functioning, and how this may present in individuals with ASD. Examples will be discussed and strategies for individuals and families will be presented. The training will be offered onsite (location TBA) or online via Adobe Connect. Is your child approaching the age of 18? Do you realize you are going to lose your parental authority?

A guardian is a surrogate decision-maker appointed by the court to make either personal and/or financial decisions for a minor or for an adult with mental or physical disabilities. Typically, this would be a disability that is expected to span the lifetime of the individual.

In Florida, there are three types of guardianships:

- 1. Plenary
- 2. Limited
- 3. Advocacy

The first two were originally set up to protect the elderly and can be quite effective in accomplishing that goal. The problem is that those forms of guardianship were not created to protect those with cognitive disabilities. Fortunately, the Florida legislature enacted Guardianship Advocacy statute 393.12. This form of guardianship is specifically designed to protect those under the age of 65 with cognitive issues. The costs of Advocacy are generally much less and certainly less complex.

To file advocacy, one needs a letter from the doctor detailing the situation of the impaired person. There is still a hearing but not nearly as cumbersome and this is not an incapacitation hearing. Retaining an attorney (although often a good idea) is no longer required for this filing in the state of Florida. At the hearing a decision can be made as to which rights will remain and which will be assigned to the guardian. For example; one could take the health, living and financial responsibilities while leaving the right to vote and marry. As you can see, this form of guardianship has its real advantages. Please keep in mind that if you are a non-natural parent, in order to be a Guardian, you will need to prepare with some required training.

The exact statute is printed below:

Developmental Disabilities - Guardian Advocate - Florida Statute 393.12

A petition for guardian advocate may be executed by an adult person who is a resident of Florida. The petition must allege that a person with developmental disabilities needs a guardian advocate and lacks the ability to meet at least some of the essential requirements for his/her health or safety. The court sets a hearing date, counsel is appointed for the person with developmental disabilities and all interested persons are noticed of the hearing. At the hearing, the court shall receive and review all reports relevant to the person's disabilities. If the court finds that the person requires the appointment of a guardian advocate, the court shall enter a written order. Said order shall contain the findings of fact and conclusion of law. The order shall specify the exact powers and duties of the guardian advocate. Once the order is entered, the guardian advocate shall have the same powers and responsibilities required of a guardian under Florida Statute 744.

Training Description

Students on the autism spectrum can often present as proficient readers, especially in the early elementary grades. By the time they reach 2nd or 3rd grade however, deficits in reading comprehension begin to become more apparent. One possible explanation for this is actually due to a more global deficit in comprehension, specifically in social inferential comprehension. The Theory of Mind deficit that was identified in even the highest functioning children on the spectrum in the 1980's is still the leading explanation. To have a Theory of Mind is to be able to attribute mental states to oneself and others. Simply put, it is the ability to take someone else's perspective. If perspective taking abilities are deficient in the "real world", they may serve to explain why there are reading comprehension deficits that often plague our students when it comes to understanding emotions, cause and effect, making predictions and inferences within a text.

This presentation will offer a thorough explanation of Theory of Mind, reading comprehension and offer suggestions on how to teach requisite skills in order to help students become better social inferential comprehenders – and readers!

TIPS FOR PURCHASING GIFTS FOR CHILDREN WITH ASD

When picking out gifts and toys for children on the autism spectrum think about products that will promote family engagement. Look for gifts that require more than one person to play. Games that have a fun, or unpredictable result are a great idea. For these types of games, let your child know that to play



these games they need to have a play partner. This will provide opportunities to practice turn taking skills, and prevent repetitive play with the toy. Another great gift idea is any toy that has multiple pieces so that the child has opportunities to practice requesting while assembling the toy or game. Rocket balloons, popup games that require turn taking, big parachutes, and favorite character memory card games are some fun ideas. INTERESTED IN LEARNING MORE ABOUT YOUR CHILD'S EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT?

At Florida Atlantic University (Jupiter or Boca), we are conducting research with children ages 4 to 8 who have been diagnosed with Autism spectrum disorder, as well as children who have not been diagnosed with this disorder. The goal of the study is to see whether children recognize emotions of their mothers more than of an unknown female. We want to see if this relates to a specific emotion as well as to see if the results differ from a child with autism compared to a child who does not have autism. We are looking for children ages 4 to 8 as well as their mothers to participate in this research study. There will be two sessions lasting about an hour to an hour and a half each, both sessions will be conducted either at your home or a Developmental lab at Florida Atlantic University. During the first session, we will use an EEG, electroencephalogram, machine to collect brain wave recordings of your child. We will take pictures of the child's mother making different faces corresponding to different emotions to use during the next session. During the second session, your child will complete an emotion recognition task where the goal is to select the facial expression that best matches the indicated emotion. Once we have completed the task your child can then select a toy of their choice from our collection! AUTISM ALERT SYSTEM COMES TO OKEECHOBEE!

The holidays are a crazy time of the year. We are so easily distracted by all the hoopla and individuals with autism are so easily overwhelmed. Okeechobee County has added an Autism Alert System to their Emergency Alert System. This is so great for two reasons:

- You have immediate, trained and comprehensive help if your child is one of the 49% of children with ASD who will attempt to leave their safe environment and wander. If you have a 7-10 year old with ASD, they are 8 times more likely to elope.
- As youth with ASD become more independent they are more likely to have an encounter
 with law enforcement. The stress from this may cause them to shut down or act
 unpredictably. These behaviors can be misinterpreted by the officer and the situation can
 easily escalate. If their information is in the alert system, officers will know exactly how to
 approach and communicate with them.

Autism Speaks has created the form that Okeechobee County is using to gather information about individuals with autism spectrum disorders. The information from the form will be added to the dispatchers' emergency alert system. Okeechobee county residents should print it out and fill it in. You can return the form in two ways, 1) Drop it off at Okeechobee County's Emergency Operations Center, 707 Northwest 6th Street, Okeechobee, Florida 34972, or, 2) Scan and email it to Lt. Ryan Hathaway at: rhathaway@co.okeechobee.fl.us. There is nothing more important than keeping our kiddos safe. Please take this easy step that will help first responders in Okeechobee know how to meet the needs of individuals with autism spectrum disorders.

How much will it cost?



John Miller was born in 1968 in Montreal, Quebec. As a child he dealt with many social and academic difficulties. After many struggles and hard work he graduated from high school in 1986. John completed a BA in Political Science from Florida Atlantic University. A few years later he decided to get a Masters in Special Education, in order to help those with special needs. 


AUTISM IN THE NEW YEAR: THE HOPES AND FEARS OF 2017

In the world of health care the New Year is often a time when health care plans enforce new rules and regulations regarding benefits. Unfortunately in my experience many of these changes are negative for families. Frequently benefits are reduced, fewer medications are covered, and deductibles increase resulting in more out of pocket expenses for families. This year no one really knows what lies ahead. I would like to offer families faced with the challenges of getting the necessary services and coverage for their child with ASD some ideas to work around the obstacles they may face in 2017.

The areas I am most concerned about in 2017 for my families include: services covered by health plans and changes in legal mandates in public education. Although 2017 will likely bring changes to health insurance for everyone, it has always been more challenging for families with children who have special health care needs. In our office we frequently push insurance companies and public agencies for services. We are sometimes faced with the reality of no insurance benefits for ASD and limited public services. When we don't have the time to wait for appeals, waiting lists, and lack of coverage we find ways to empower families to get treatment in spite of these obstacles.



First we start by looking at all of the ways to effectively train parents. CARD is an excellent resource for workshops and seminars to help parents learn skills and techniques to work with their child on the spectrum. In addition there are frequently trainings offered by local private ABA companies, therapy centers, charitable organizations and service agencies (the family services council, ARC etc.). Listings can easily be found through an internet search. Some good websites include: www.211palmbeach.org, www.arcpbc.org, autism speaks has a local resource guide, www.floridaautismguide.org, and www.autism.fau.edu the FAU CARD website is a great portal to find other resources.

I also recommend The Early Start Denver Model Parent Handbook by Geraldine Dawson to every parent of a child under 6 years of age. This provides every day activities to make interaction with your child with ASD therapeutic. In addition an excellent resource for families of young children with autism is the Autism Navigator http://www.autismnavigator.com. This site is full of excellent resources for parents to help with behavior management and to build skills. It also has an excellent video library full of information and real world examples.

An excellent resource for older children is The Parents' Guide to Teaching Kids with Asperger Syndrome and Similar ASDs Real-Life Skills for Independence by Patrician Romanowski. Some of the best publishers to search for the most update books and materials on ASD include: Jessica Kingsley, Wiley, Brookes, Woodbine House, and Future Horizons. Google any of these publishing companies to view their catalogues. Also be sure to check out www.socialthinking.com for materials to work on pragmatics and social skills.

I also recommend online ABA platforms too so parents and caregivers can learn some basic principles to work on behaviors and skills at home (a few examples - www.rethink.first.com and www.udiscovering.org). Be sure to check the credentials of the people offering the online ABA programs as quality of the information provided can vary. Do not just sign up for what looks good or is affordable, check the credentials of the organization by asking physicians, therapists or teachers involved in your child's care.

Another option is to investigate what may be offered at local universities and colleges (FAU, U. of M, FIU, and NOVA). Many of these institutions have research projects which offer assessments, treatments, or opportunities to monitor progress at no charge. You can look for these opportunities by searching in appropriate departments such as psychology, behavioral sciences, education, speech and language, occupational therapy etc. In particular, schools with graduate programs are more likely to have ongoing research projects.

Finally, involve extended family, members of religious organizations with which you affiliate, neighbors etc. to become a part of your child's team. Bartering services, trading, and returning favors can provide you with ways to find more willing people to help you work with your child.

Regarding public educational services I often have to refer my families to others for help. Physicians can provide some assistance by writing letters, confirming or making diagnoses, and signing off on forms requiring an MD. However, as most families know having a diagnosis is insufficient to mandate services. When families run in to challenges I recommend contacting an advocate through the public system or privately. Be mindful that adversarial relationships with your school ESE department do no serve your child well. ESE departments are committed to providing special education services but they have to deal with the unfortunate reality of funding shortages, institutional delays and overcrowding. My advice for families here is always to try your best to work in a collaborative way even if that means you have to take the lead to establish a positive tone in meetings and communications with teachers and administrators. Of course no one will advocate for your child with the same commitment as a parent, but along the way families can find allies and mentors who will care too. My advice is to seek out these individuals and nourish these relationships for the benefit of your child. The Palm Beach County the ESE advisory committee can be a good starting place https://www.palmbeachschools. org/ese/eseadvisorycommittee. Also http://wrightslaw.com has a solid reputation of providing families with accurate information about your legal rights in the public education system. Additionally, there are lawyers and professional advocates for hire who can provide families with much needed assistance when necessary. Be sure to vet consultants you hire – checking their credentials and reputations thoroughly.

Our Summer Academy is a training opportunity for teachers and other professionals working with individuals with autism spectrum disorders. On each day, different topics will be presented to help provide evidence-based and effective strategies for professionals to utilize in their daily practice.

Monday, July 24

Dr. Debra Leach, Ed.D., BCBA 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

This one-day workshop provides educators with step-by-step procedures for using applied behavior analysis (ABA) to design and implement interventions to target the needs of students with autism spectrum disorders (ASD) in inclusive classrooms. Participants will learn how to conduct meaningful assessments to gather relevant information to assist with setting individualized goals. Sample assessment tools will be provided. Attendees will learn how to use assessment data to set attainable goals for ABA interventions. Procedures will then be shared for designing ABA interventions that will be embedded within the context of everyday instructional and non-instructional classroom activities to address the goals selected. A multitude of behavioral teaching strategies will be discussed that can be used when designing individualized interventions. User-friendly data collection tools will be shared to allow for consistency in monitoring student progress. Tips will be shared for building collaborative relationships among special educators, general educators, related service providers and families to ensure success when designing and implementing ABA interventions in inclusive classrooms.

Debra Leach is Board Certified Behavior Analyst and Associate Professor of Special Education at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, SC. She is also the Project Director of the Winthrop Think College program, a fully inclusive post-secondary program for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Her areas of specialization are autism spectrum disorders, applied behavior analysis, positive behavioral interventions and supports, differentiated instruction, and inclusion from birth to adulthood. She has authored three books and a variety of journal articles related to these topics to support educators with implementing evidence based practices across home, school and community contexts.

Anxiety is one of the most prevalent and impairing co-occurring conditions in children, teens, and young adults with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Although prevalence rates vary, most studies indicate that approximately one-half of individuals with ASD meet the criteria for at least one anxiety disorder. Fear, worry, and anxiety can result in personal distress in children, parents, and siblings, increase challenging behavior, restrict activities/opportunities, and negatively impact the quality of life for child and family.

This workshop presentation will focus on the tools and strategies that can be implemented to reduce anxiety and increase self-regulation and coping skills in children and teens. The objective is for participants to understand the nature, prevalence, and impact of anxiety and to explore the types of modifications, accommodations, and supports that can help alleviate anxiety and improve the educational and social outcomes for children and youth on the autism spectrum.
