

Executive Director's Update

Dear CARD Families,

We are now facing a substantial budget cut. Our budget for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, like the budgets of the other CARD centers, has been reduced by 20.22%. Since 2006, FAU CARD has lost a total of \$120,000. The Florida Atlantic University Center for Autism & Related Disabilities (FAU CARD) provides a variety of free services to people with autism of all ages. We are one of seven centers around the state funded from the General Revenue of the State of Florida. Our service area includes Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie, Okeechobee and Indian River counties.

The number of people diagnosed with autism continues to rise along with the number of individuals and families seeking our services. To date, our client registry consists of over 2,500 families and growing. We have met this demand and have exceeded our goals and productivity each year since 2006. Unfortunately, during that same time period the statewide CARD program has experienced a 35% cut in funds. At FAU CARD, we have tried to operate our center in a way that minimizes the impact these cuts have on the services provided to you.

We are committed to providing services to you and your family; however, we cannot absorb this current budget cut without significant changes to the services we do provide. Below is how the budget cuts will affect services provided by FAU CARD.

- We have decided not to layoff any clinical staff so that we can continue to meet the existing demand.
- A part-time clerical staff member will be laid-off.
- Local travel will be limited. This will impact the number of home, school and community visits we can schedule. Home and school visits will be made for crisis cases and limited to 3 per client per year.
- Live home and school visits will be available through our online services. Here, we will be able to assist with issues that you are experiencing and provide you with suggestions to resolve the problems.

- Office visits and on-campus trainings will continue as they have in the past. There are an unlimited number of office visits made available to you and we will continue to conduct our regular trainings and workshops.
- We will also expand our online training capabilities. Additional trainings will be posted on our website and we will begin to conduct live trainings online.
- We will discontinue most support groups. We will only continue to offer the support group for adults with autism spectrum disorders. This is a severely underserved population and we feel the need to continue to support those who lose almost all supports once they leave school. All other groups will no longer meet starting September 2011. Although we will discontinue our other groups, we will assist any agency or school that is interested in starting a group. We will also be incorporating a support and parent networking component to all future trainings.

We deeply regret that these changes have to be made. We have been doing so much with so little for a very long time. This last round of budget cuts brought us to the point where we can no longer operate as we have previously. Our hope is that the future will bring additional funding so that we can offer our full array of programs. We continue to be active in our fundraising so as to offset state cuts and welcome donations at any time. Had it not been for the success of our recent fundraising efforts and the generosity of several important donors, we would have had to lay off one or more full time staff.

All of us at CARD are passionate about working with you. We hope you understand the decisions that had to be made and we look forward to working with you throughout this next year.

MEDICAL UPDATE

New Medication Frontiers for Autism Spectrum Disorders

Several years ago families may have read about a breakthrough study in 2007 at MIT where researchers were able to duplicate Fragile X in laboratory mice, give them autistic like symptoms and reverse symptoms of mental retardation and autism by manipulating their genome. As is always the case in medicine, there can be years or even decades before a basic science discoveries translate into clinically beneficial intervention for humans. Sometimes what is thought of as a scientific "breakthrough" never materializes and we learn to live with the hype of the headlines, never getting too excited they may come to fruition.

In the case of this discovery, families may soon be able to benefit from another treatment option. The pharmaceutical companies and researchers have been working on a way to produce a compound which can be given to individuals with Fragile X and autism to produce the positive changes found in the original experiments. Since the original research at MIT, several studies have been underway in the private sector and the National Institute of Health to see if the clinical symptoms of Fragile X and autism can be modified in any way.

The exciting thing about these studies for families is this is one of the first times a medication is being targeted for core symptoms of autism and reversal of impairment. The medications in trial are all trying to interrupt a protein pathway in the cells which result in the symptoms commonly seen in Fragile X and autism. Until now, medications we

use in autism are to help lessen problematic symptoms and behaviors – hyperactivity, aggression, rigidity, obsessive and compulsive tendencies, inattention, anxiety, etc. What this new era in pharmaceutical research may signal is the beginning of the search for medications that can treat core symptoms of autism. This is one example and there are others where research is targeting the use of pharmaceuticals for cure or reversal of negative symptoms.

Other clinical trials are exploring the use of existing medications, such as Aricept used to treat Alzheimer's, in children with autism. The Aricept study is not yet complete, but its goal is also targeting more of the core symptoms. In particular, theorizing that many children with autism have disrupted REM sleep which impacts their behavior and cognitive abilities. Another study is looking at d-cycloserine (an antibiotic) to treat symptoms of social withdrawal. Although we do not have the outcome data yet on many of these studies, parents should know what is in the works and what may be available one day soon. This is not to place too much emphasis on pharmaceuticals as the answer, but is it one prong of a multi-pronged approach to improve the lives of individuals on the spectrum.
