

Dear CARD Families,

We hope you had a smooth transition to the school year. It is hard to believe that once again we are approaching the holidays. It has been a very busy and productive year at FAU CARD!

In our previous newsletter, I shared that, due to the increased funding from the Florida Legislature, we were able to hire six new staff members. I would like to welcome our Clinical Support Specialist Veronica Castro, Susanna Launder, and Rosie Portera. Also joining our team are Jennifer Pollack, Clinical Specialist for Transitioning; Darius Murray, Clinical Associate for Mentoring; and Mercedes Pagano, Coordinator for Marketing, Information and Publications. We are very excited to have in place a very well-rounded, expert group of professionals. The FAU CARD team now consists of professionals with extensive special education experience and training including three Board Certified Behavior Analysts; a clinical psychologist, a speech and language pathologist, two mental health clinicians and a rehabilitation counselor. Additionally, I would like to welcome Elisa Cruz-Torres to her new role as Assistant Director. Dr. Ali Cunningham has moved to a visiting professorship position with FAU, but will continue to consult for FAU CARD. We are very fortunate to have such a diverse and professional group of staff at FAU CARD. Please take a moment to welcome our new staff and congratulate Elisa and Ali as you see them at our various events. Remember, none of this would be possible without the increased funding from our Florida Legislators. As you meet with your legislator, please thank them for supporting FAU CARD and all of the CARD centers.

FAU CARD had several very successful training events this fall. Dr. Merrill Winston, Board Certified Behavior Analyst, presented on October 3rd to an audience of professionals and family members on strategies to reduce restraint and seclusion and utilize procedures to teach coping strategies to individuals on the spectrum. On November 7 and 14 we collaborated with United Way, Boys Town and Sandy Pines to offer trainings on increasing reading fluency and utilizing behavior analysis to address mental health concerns. FAU CARD sponsored the Verbal Behavior Milestone Assessment and Placement Program (VB-MAPP) training on December 12th by Dr. Mark Sundberg, developer of the instrument, to a large group of professionals. Additionally, we are excited to share with you information about several upcoming training events: FAU CARD is sponsoring a Community Speaker Series in January, February and March of 2015; Grandparent training series in February 2015; Early Indicators training in February of 2015 and Diagnosis and Intervention for ASD Across Multiple Perspectives on March 26th. ADHD and ASD: What Every Parent Should Know

For many years, before the publication of the DSM-V last year, parents and doctors were well aware of the overlap of ADHD with Autism Spectrum Disorders. Prior to the publication of the current diagnostic manual, children with autism could not technically be diagnosed with also having ADHD too. This was predominantly a technicality. It was presumed that the ADHD symptoms and behaviors a child with autism experienced were a part of the autism, not a separate condition, therefore a child could not be formally diagnosed with both ASD and ADHD.

Times have changed and new diagnostic criteria permit the use of a separate diagnosis of ADHD for a child with autism if it is clinically applicable. Difficulties with attention and activity are common in autism. Some children are overly focused on a narrow area of interest, others are unable to focus at all due to overstimulation or self stimulation. Some children are excessively active, impatient, and impulsive. All of these ADHD symptoms can be so impairing that their treatment is necessary for progress in language, motor planning, adaptive behaviors, self help skills and academics.



Generally, when children are evaluated by a medical professional for ASD, they are also being evaluated for cooccurring challenges and disorders. This typically includes an evaluation for ADHD. This may require parents and teachers to complete rating scales, as well as more detailed information about the child's ability to complete tasks, follow directions, and maintain self control. To meet criteria for ADHD, the child must have at least 6 of the symptoms of inattention and/or 6 of the symptoms of hyperactivity and impulsivity. It is also important to know that an individual can have three different forms of ADHD: ADHD-inattentive (not hyperactive), ADHDhyperactive/impulsive (not inattentive), or combined type ADHD. Here are the characteristics/criteria for assessing ADHD:

Inattention

- 1. Often does not give close attention to details or makes careless mistakes in schoolwork, work, or other activities.
- 2. Often has trouble keeping attention on tasks or play activities.
- 3. Often does not seem to listen when spoken to directly.
- 4. Often does not follow through on instructions and fails to finish schoolwork, chores, or duties in the workplace (not due to oppositional behavior or failure to understand instructions).
- 5. Often has trouble organizing activities.
- 6. Often avoids, dislikes, or doesn't want to do things that take a lot of mental effort for a long period of time (such as schoolwork or homework).
- 7. Often loses things needed for tasks and activities (e.g. toys, school assignments, pencils, books, or tools).
- 8. Is often easily distracted.
- 9. Is often forgetful in daily activities.

Hyperactivity and Impulsivity

- 1. Often fidgets with hands or feet or squirms in seat when sitting still is expected.
- 2. Often gets up from seat when remaining in seat is expected.
- 3. Often excessively runs about or climbs when and where it is not appropriate (adolescents or adults may feel very restless).
- 4. Often has trouble playing or doing leisure activities quietly.
- 5. Is often "on the go" or often acts as if "driven by a motor".
- 6. Often talks excessively.
- 7. Often blurts out answers before questions have been finished.
- 8. Often has trouble waiting one's turn.
- 9. Often interrupts or intrudes on others (e.g., butts into conversations or games).

To meet eligibility for an ADHD diagnosis, symptoms can be present as young as 4 years of age, but must be apparent before the age of 12. Along with the symptoms, there needs to be IMPAIRMENT. This means problems must be exhibited at home and in school interfering with their daily function. Common problems include: disrupting class, difficulty following directions, trouble with organizational skills, inability to complete assignments and tasks, poor compliance, academic or peer issues, difficulties with group activities, relationship problems with parents, teachers or siblings.

As you can see there is quite a bit of overlap between these symptoms and the behavioral issues in children with autism. The proper identification of ADHD in children with autism may lead to additional treatments, school based accommodations, and behavioral support provided at home which could be beneficial.

Understanding ADHD may help parents to work more effectively with their child with autism. For example, behavioral methods (token economy, frequent rewards ,breaking down instructions), classroom accommodations and modifications, nutritional approaches (increased protein intake with each meal, removing dyes and preservatives, organic food, etc), regular exercise, sufficient sleep, and medications, may be beneficial depending on the needs of your child.

For years, physicians have used ADHD medications in autism, typically the stimulants, non-stimulants, and strattera. There are limited small studies to show efficacy of many of the ADHD medications in helping children with autism. However, there can also be increased side effects in children with autism, such as: increased anxiety and OCD-like behaviors, agitation, aggression, and worsened sleep and eating habits. Understanding autism first and its behavioral and psychological effects are important if deciding to treat coexisting ADHD with medication. It is always recommended you consult with a medical doctor before making changes in diet or medication.

A former semiconductor engineer turned full-time writer and speaker, David has written for The New York Times, Huffington Post, and Slate, and he writes a relationship blog for Psychology Today. But his greatest accomplishment by far has been learning how to thrive as a family man.





motivated to succeed—be it in their career, their marriage, or any aspect of their life—David's talks lend a message of hope and inspiration from which anyone can benefit. "

Oh, You Needed Me to Pay Attention?" Classroom Perspective from a Deceptively Remarkable Student This presentation is specifically geared for educators, administrators, and parents who find themselves occasionally baffled by their students. K-12 and higher education benefit equally, and in many cases CEUs may be offered for attending.

"Oh, You Needed Me to Pay Taxes?" Successful Transitions for Individuals on the Autism Spectrum
Navigating transition from elementary education into high school, high school in college or vocation, and college
into career involves a little more for individuals with special needs. When high school is over, the IEP may go away but
the needs persist. This lecture addresses considerations of transition, including such crucial life skills as making
friends, dating, getting and staying organized, dealing with difficult emotions, dealing with looser schedules and
greater uncertainty, interviewing, disclosure, and above all, achieving independence.

John Elder Robison grew up with Asperger's, at a time when the diagnosis didn't exist, and with no inkling of how to pass for normal. (He was finally diagnosed at age forty.) In his incredibly readable, bestselling memoir, Look Me In the Eye, Robison recounts his incredible life, with illuminating insight. The book was named one of the top books of the year by Amazon, was listed in Publisher's Weekly as one of the top selling books in America for three years in a row, and was a finalist for the Books for a Better Life Award.



Robison's second book, Be Different is an honest, darkly humorous glimpse of Asperger's as a difference, not a disability. Beyond the real-life tales on its pages, Be Different offers practical advice for parents and educator he captures the irreducible strangeness of the human mind and the irrepressible strength of the human spirit -- and provides us a fresh perspective on the autism now afflicting so many children. His third book, Raising Cubby, tells the story of him - an autistic dad - raising a geeky son who's also on the spectrum. His newest book - Switched On - is coming in the fall of 2015 and will tell the story of a groundbreaking Harvard Medical School study to change emotional intelligence in people with autism. In his talks, Robison details how he overcame enormous odds to lead a fulfilling life: from an anti-social

child to a successful father now running a multi-million dollar car specialty shop and his own photography business. Though his life is unique -- he's designed guitars for KISS and toys for Milton Bradley -- it's equally rich with clues to both spotting autism in children and harnessing the best from those already diagnosed. (Autistic kids excel at math, in engineering, and with technology.)

John is the Neurodiversity Scholar in Residence at The College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, VA. W&M is the first major American university to integrate neurodiversity into its curriculum. In addition, he's a co-founder of a vocational and life skills high school program for teens on the spectrum, and he has served on the Interagency Autism Coordinating Committee and many other autism-related boards.

A Sibling Perspective: Future Planning by Megan Allore

As I write, Thanksgiving is right around the corner. I'm spending it with my family, in my hometown of Stuart, FL. I'm looking forward to a long weekend away from the bustle of Miami and, even more importantly, looking forward to my favorite Thanksgiving staple—green bean casserole!

Besides eating, this Thanksgiving weekend, my family will be getting together a for another reason. We are having a formal meeting to discuss my brother lan's future care, my parent's plans as they age, and some "what if" scenarios regarding my brother. My fiancé Eric will also be joining this conversation, since these decisions will now affect his life as much as mine.

Here are the questions I will be asking:

- With Ian about to age out of public school, how do we all support a meaningful post-high school plan?
- What is the plan for lan's living situation? Will he stay in his current group home?
- Will lan need to live with my parents or me at some point? Under what circumstances does this become necessary?
- If Eric and I live somewhere besides Stuart where Ian currently lives, do we move him into another group living situation that is closer to us or do we move him with us?
- Do we have the means to try to start a Special Needs Trust to support Ian financially?
- What are our wishes if Ian ever develops a major disease or life-threatening illness? How do we balance the suffering he may encounter in treatment since he may not understand what's going on or be able to easily cooperate with certain treatments? What's ethical and right?
- Do my parents have wills and advance directives in place?
- At what point do I become the primary guardian for lan?



Some of these questions are hard to face. Who wants to talk about their parents dying someday? Or what we think we want to do should lan ever develop something like cancer? But I cannot underscore enough how important it is to talk openly about these topics, as uncomfortable as they may be. Siblings especially need to know what their parents' views are so that in the case that the parents aren't there when the decisions need to be made for the special needs family member, the sibling knows that everyone is on the same team.

Many readers have young children and, although it may not be appropriate just yet to have the kind of conversation I'm about to have with my family, parents should find some ways to let their typical children know that there are plans in place. Even as young as 10, I was already thinking about how I needed to make decisions that would enable Ian to live with me. It never crossed my mind that my mom had plans in place to someday transition him to a group home and knowing this would have lifted some of the heavy responsibility I felt at such a young age.

Just as important as it is for parents to make some of the decisions in advance, parents should also solicit input from the typical sibling(s) because of the life-long nature of their relationship with the special needs child. Parents should never assume that the typical child will go along with any and all decisions made by the parents, as the typical child has a right to make his or her own choices in life and sometimes that doesn't include as active of a role in the special needs sibling's life as parents may prefer.

Many resources exist online for how to have these kinds of hard conversations. A new book was just published that may be of particular interest to siblings and parents called *The Sibling Survival Guide: Indispensable Information for Brothers and Sisters of Adults with Disabilities* edited by Don Meyer and Emily Holl. There are chapters on topics such as future planning, advocacy, and caring for multiple generations.

Establishing a plan and drafting any necessary documents should be a part of every family's strategy in providing the best quality of life for their special needs child, and siblings must be included in that process. Siblings face a lot of responsibility, and legislation like the Family Medical Leave Act allows for parents and siblings to take time off work without losing their job to care for a child does not have any written provisions. Knowing this, the more support and planning in place the better to prevent undue stress on everyone or interruptions in care for any vulnerable family members.

So, as Thanksgiving rapidly approaches, I give thanks for my amazing brother who always helps me keep perspective on what's important, my parents and their bravery to face these hard questions, and my new fiancé who stands next to me and takes on my wacky and wonderful family. By the time you read this article, I hope you had joyous and safe holidays!

Locator Bracelets are distributed in St Lucie County!



I, Cathy Allore, previously announced a locator bracelet program (Project Protect) FAU-CARD, St Lucie County Sheriff's Office, Pilot Club of Fort Pierce, and SafetyNet® by LoJack was collaborating on to provide to St Lucie County residents. St. Lucie County Sheriff Office committed to providing bracelets and one year of monitoring costs to 25 families in St Lucie County who met pre-determined eligibility criteria. The program was funded by a grant applied for and received by Sgt Cavallaro of the St Lucie County Sheriff Office. On December 9th, Project Protect Parent Orientation and Training was held in the FAU-CARD Office @ IRSC in St Lucie County.

SafetyNet® Representative, Natalia Cuervo, and Cathy Allore, FAU-CARD Clinician provided the Orientation and Training to fourteen families who met the eligibility criteria. The parent orientation and training was designed to provide training on safety issues related to autism spectrum disorders and specifically targeted Wandering and Elopement behavior. Natalia provided the orientation and maintenance requirements of SafetyNet®, such as daily testing of the battery and semi-annual battery changes. There are still eleven bracelets available and if your child, adolescent, or young adult meets the following criteria, please contact me for the final Project Protect Parent Orientation and Training to be scheduled in either late January or early February.

- Live in St Lucie County?
- Has a documented diagnosis of autism?
- Is registered with or willing to register with CARD?
- Has a history of wandering or elopement behavior?
- Has a safety plan in place at home or school?
- Is documentation available of wandering or elopement behavior?
- Receiving services under Medicaid Waiver?
- Receives 24/7 supervision for safety?

Parents who attended the training were very thankful to us for providing the much needed 'piece of mind' in helping them address the safety concerns they face daily in parenting and keeping their family member with autism safe. The Orientation and Training offered in two sessions. The afternoon session had 6 families represented and the evening session had 8 families represented. The treatment is 12 weeks long and meets every Monday afternoon from 5:30 p.m. to 6:45 p.m. during Spring 2015.

Where will the group occur?

Groups will be held in two locations:

- FAU Boca Raton campus (starts Monday 01/26/2015)

- FAU Jupiter campus (starts Monday 02/09/2015)

How much will it cost?

A charge of \$30/session, a total of \$360 for the 12-week program.

Children's Friendship Training is an evidence-based treatment program developed by Fred Frankel, Ph.D., ABPP, and Robert Myatt, Ph.D. at the UCLA Semel Institute for Neuroscience and Human Beahvior to teach elementary school-aged children with high functioning ASD and other social difficulties how to make and keep friends. Some of the topics that will be addressed over the course of treatment include: Conversational skills, Finding common interests, Joining games, Good sportsmanship, Changing your reputation, Appropriate playdate behavior, Handling teasing and bullying, and Managing conflicts with adults and peers.



Why are parents involved?

The Children's Friendship Training program is unique in its inclusion of a parent group, which is a requirement of the program, so that parents can provide support and coaching to their child as friendship skills are developed.
