Executive Director's Update

Dear CARD Families,

The holidays are a great time of year to be with family to have fun and share experiences. But it can also be a time in which some risks to children with ASD are increased. Parents face many challenges with their children- those with or without ASD- but safety is right at the top of the list.

Travel can be a challenge. Be sure your child is buckled up or secured in the appropriate child safety seat. We know that many children on the autism spectrum fuss or even tantrum in efforts to avoid being buckled up. Parents have to be persistent to make sure their child travels safely. Bringing items likely to be of interest to your child such as books, toys and electronic devices can help make the trip more pleasant for them and reduce stress all around. If you are simply not able to get your child to cooperate with buckling up or being secured in their child safety seat, make contact with our CARD staff so we can provide assistance and guidance.

Home fires are more common during the winter. This is a good time to check your fire alarms and replace batteries. Schools conduct routine fire drills and this has shown to be essential in assuring that children in the U.S. stay safe in the occurrence of real school fires. Home fire drills make sense. Children with autism and other disabilities often hide in their room under beds or in closets when an actual fire occurs. We all know the value of practice in helping a child with ASD understand how to act in a future situations. It is a great idea to help them practice

what to do in the event of a fire alarm. The holidays offer a great time to have a practice fire drill at your home.

Finally, wandering is a serious worry at any time of the year but with more activity during the holidays, children may be more likely to wander. Wandering is especially dangerous in our FAU CARD region with so many surrounding pools, lakes, ponds, canals and other temping targets for children with ASD who like water. I am currently involved in conducting research here at FAU and have found that about 80% of children with ASD wander. Update your home security arrangements to keep up with the physical growth of your child. The extra latch on the front door that might have kept a 4-year-old in the house may now not keep your 8-year-old safe. Monitoring is critical. While in the company of others, it can be easy for parents to assume someone else is keeping an eye on their child while in actuality no one may be watching them. Knowing your child's patterns is also important. If things get too busy in the home, the child may become anxious and wander in search of a less busy environment. Taking the child for a walk is a safe alternative.

Have a wonderful time over the holiday season and help keep the focus on safety for all children by providing extra attention to the special safety concerns of children with autism.

MEDICAL UPDATE

Autism Spectrum Disorders: The Next Frontiers in Civil Rights

For parents and families who have a loved one with an autism spectrum disorder priorities change all the time. During the early years, the focus is on early intervention. This means obtaining effective therapies, seeking appropriate education, developing communicative language, and promoting appropriate social skills. Families work diligently trying to ensure their children receive the best therapies and are constantly looking for interventions with the most promise and best track records in helping their children with autism.

As children mature, their needs change and educational and school environments often become more complex and difficult to navigate. Social pressures affecting individuals on the spectrum increase with age causing various levels of stress and tension. Inappropriate behaviors and habits can be harder to manage in older individuals when they violate social norms (i.e. personal space, hygiene, etc). Parents find that there are fewer resources shrinking as children move into their teen years and young adult hood. These issues are often considered part of "transitioning to adulthood" and have become a hot topic amongst autism advocates and organizations such as CARD dedicated to improving the welfare of individuals with autism.

What I would like to offer today is a small glimpse at the future. Sometimes parents are so consumed in the moment when children are younger they don't consider the long term perspective. We do invest in prepaid college tuition programs, we fund savings accounts for future needs, we take out insurance policies to protect our families these are all strategies that are important. But what about our kids in the spectrum? Are we adequately addressing the needs they will face as adults? We all know at this point Autism is a spectrum in the broadest sense of the word. With skills ranging from intellectual genius to intellectually deficient, hyper verbal to non-verbal, savant to severely delayed there are times

it is difficult to identify what we need to advocate for with Autism Spectrum Disorders due to the diversity of individuals in the spectrum. However, there are some common themes which apply to all individual with ASD and these include:

- The basic human right to self determination
- Equal opportunity
- Freedom from discrimination based on disability

I do see a future where a civil rights platform for individuals on the spectrum may be on the horizon. As the numbers of children with ASD grow up, society will feel the pressure of the special interests of individuals with ASD mount. Many organizations including CARD, Autism Speaks, the Autism Society of America and others have lobbied on state and national levels for the rights of children with autism for years. Now, we may see a future where individuals with ASD, such as Ari Ne'eman, who advocate for themselves, with the most able members on the spectrum speaking for those lacking in communication skills.

I welcome the day when our political system and society as a whole recognizes that individuals with ASD have unique abilities and contributions to make to the world. I eagerly await the day our first political leaders step forward and share that he or she is on the spectrum and rocks the world with their announcement. We know they are out there; we may even have hunches in the current political system about who is or is not on the spectrum. We may be able to surmise with considerable accuracy who these individuals are and whether or not they are willing to admit to or disclose a diagnosis. I know in my life time I will see the admission, "I am on the Spectrum" announced from the office podium of a member of the House, the Senate, who knows...the oval office one day? This may in fact be the next frontier in Autism advocacy.

Understanding Neurodevelopmental Aspects of Autism Spectrum Disorders: Biological Basis and Clinical Implications

Recently presented findings at the Society for Neuroscience in November 2011 showed a 2/3 increase in the number of brain cells in prefrontal cortex of post-mortem brain tissue in ASD compared to neurotypicals. This construct supports an evolving clinical focus on ASD's relative strengths mediated by earlier maturing components of neural circuitry and provides further evidence supporting ASD as a disorder of accelerated/overexpansive brain development.

This talk assumes no prior knowledge of neuroscience.

The FAU Communication Disorders Clinic (CDC) offers teen social skills group that involves parents as social coaches

In collaboration with the FAU Center for Autism and Related Disabilities (CARD), the FAU CDC will begin offering a social skills treatment group where teens diagnosed with high functioning autism or Asperger's will learn how to make and keep friends.

Registered teens, ages 12 through 19 and enrolled in middle or high school, will participate in a social skills evidence-based treatment program called PEERS (Program for the Education & Enhancement of Relationship Skills). Developed by UCLA Semel Institute, this 14-week program is unique in its inclusion of a parent group (which is a requirement of the program) so that parents can provide support and coaching to their teen. Some of the topics that will be addressed over the course of treatment include: Conversational skills, Finding common interests, Reciprocal conversation, Non-verbal communication, Electronic communication, Safety, Choosing friends, Extracurricular activities, Appropriate use of humor, Potential friends and rejection, Get-togethers, Good sportsmanship, Peer rejection, Teasing & bulling, Changing a bad reputation, and Peer conflict.

The group will meet every Tuesday from 4:30 PM - 6:00 PM in the College of Education at the FAU Boca Raton campus. The charge will be \$30 per session for a total of \$420 for the 14-week program. The first treatment group will being on January 17, 2012.

Home Health Care [Hourly Avg.]	\$17.00	\$26,520.00	
Assisted Living [Monthly Avg.]	\$3,603.00	\$43,236.00	
Nursing Home [Daily Avg.]	\$238.00	\$86,870.00	

So in reflection, if one of my parents needed this and had a small nest egg, some social security funds and Medicare, the nest egg would be gone very quickly and the rest of the burden would be on me! I suppose my other parent would have to come live with me. The financial burden is devastating! In addition, I would never want to financially devastate my children. They have their own lives to live and dreams to plan for.

Putting a plan in place for yourself will take this burden off your children and if your parents are still healthy, you might be able to provide a plan of protection for them and yourself! There are even some interesting options such as buying a life insurance policy on your parents that carries a long term care rider should they need it, and if they never do, you can be the beneficiary. You will get your investment back and then some! Lots of options exist, but you have to act while you (or they) are healthy in order to get the best deal!
