| The Department of History would like to remove the foreign language requirement for the M.A. program. | | | |
| Rationale: There are two parts to this rationale: first, History M.A. students have struggled recently to complete this requirement in a timely manner, and second, that the requirement itself is not in place in similar institutions. As departments across the university have cut their language requirements, students have had fewer opportunities to fulfill the requirement to learn a foreign language through the intermediate level. At present, only the History M.A. and the Comparative Studies Ph.D. program in the College of Arts and Letters require this for graduation. The language requirement is creating a bottleneck for our students as they move toward graduation. In order to fulfill the foreign language requirement, many History M.A. students have in the past taken a graduate Reading for Research course (FRE/GER/SPN 5060). With so few programs requiring a foreign language now, enrollments in these courses are low, and as a result, LLCL is not able to offer these courses frequently enough for students to fulfill the requirement during our two-year M.A. program. After looking into the requirements for the History MA at other SUS institutions, the Department found that many have already phased out their language requirement. Continuing to require a language at the intermediate level puts us out of sync with FAU's graduate programs and with other MA-granting institutions in the state of Florida. | | | |

If approved for a thesis, the student's thesis advisor will put together a three-member thesis committee to oversee the research and writing of the thesis. This proposal and determination of the thesis committee must be submitted and approved by the graduate director and department chair before the student can register for thesis credits. The foreign language requirement must also be met before the student is permitted to enroll in thesis research.

Foreign Language Requirement

In addition to the other degree requirements, all students must fulfill the department language requirement before conferral of the degree through one of the following three options.

- 1. Passing one semester of a foreign language at the intermediate level (2220) at FAU or the equivalent at another university, as determined by the History Department's graduate committee.
- 2. Passing an equivalency exam at the intermediate (2220) level.
- 3. Passing the graduate Reading for Research course (FRE/GER/SPN 5060).

It is strongly encouraged that students fulfill this requirement soon after beginning their graduate studies.

Subject: History MA Program Requirement Change

Dear Eric,

In our department meeting today, History decided to propose a change to our MA program requirements. As we discussed last year, in order to fulfill our language requirement, students must complete an intermediate-level course in a language or take the Reading for Research Course offered by LLCL in French, German, or Spanish. In particular, our students were regularly taking FRE 5060, but based on our conversations, I understand that this will only be offered every other summer going forward.

Given the existing requirements for credits within the History Department, our students are generally not able to take additional language credits during the Fall or Spring semesters.

If we retain the language requirement for graduate students in the History MA, we will be significantly delaying graduation for many of our students. It is our belief that it would be best to eliminate the requirement, given that we are not able to provide the classes that would allow them to complete a language requirement.

Before filing paperwork to make this change, I wanted to check in with you about LLCL's position on the removal of the language requirement.
