RE: Course for ACE Masters

We are requesting permission to unveil three new courses for our online Masters in Adult and Community Education focusing on sustainability issues.

Demonstrated Needs:

Adult and community educators have historically served a wide mix of individuals:

- disenfranchised learners who found little success in varied education settings,
- individuals needing re-training for the current and ever-changing workforce,
- lifelong learners who struggle with a host of issues (e.g., low health literacy, poor financial literacy, minimum leisure pursuits, poor life skills, and limited technology fluency),
- individuals in diverse areas (e.g., rural networks, planning teams, cooperatives),
- diverse groups discriminated against or who had special needs (e.g., people dealing with life threatening needs, Veterans, handicapped, etc.), and even faith-based groups.

Helping the organizations create practical solutions in a leadership environmental culture can impact the community and the people it serves.

Adult and community educators continue to support Charles Stewart Mott's belief system that "each individual's quality of life is connected to the well-being of the community, both locally and globally". Adult and community educators serve the communities from which targeted individuals originate by encouraging the building of *communities of practice* that focus on sustainable local, state, national and even international learning communities that address the needs of the populations listed above. Through these efforts adult and community educators serve:

- schools (from preschool to universities-both private and public);
- non-profit organizations;
- workforce alliances;
- literacy collaborative;
- community planning and development units;
- public service areas (e.g., health agencies, fire and police departments, etc.);
- rural food banks and agriculture exchanges;
- technical schools, community/state colleges, just to name a few.

Adult and community educators adhere to the adage that 'you do with what you have and build what you don't'. Since the early 60's adult and community educators have always believed they must "do more with less and do it better". Historically, many of the grass-roots efforts to address environmental issues and sustainability grew out of local adult and community education endeavors.

Recently, the American Association for Adult and Continuing Education created a Special Interest Group (SIG) to address the interests of the leaders at the national and international levels of adult and community education regarding adult education and specifically sustainability. The purpose of the SIG is:

To explore and create connections between the fields of adult education and sustainability and environmental education. Members share strategies for developing learning communities that emphasize sustainability and environmental stewardship at institutional, organizational and community levels. (Retrieved from www.aaace.org/).

Adult and community educators believe that citizens can develop relationships and problem solving skills to address diverse challenges that are facing our societies. As a profession, we believe in the all of the following tenets:

Lifelong learning, self-determination and self-directedness, self-help, leadership development, institutional responsiveness, integrated delivery of services, localization as well as globalization, maximum use of resources, inclusiveness, and access to public information.

Since many of our current students exemplify these values, we have had numerous requests for these courses to meet the needs of our current and potential students. These new courses are inline with the needs of our field. Our current students come from nonprofit and corporate management, economic development, education, local government, facilities operations, public health, energy and utilities, regional planning and design, hospitality, religious service, law and in general those who are interested in building synergistic learning communities that breathe life back into the areas they serve.

The courses proposed will provide new life in our current program. The courses will encompass communicative knowledge of values, ideas, feelings and cultural concepts. Transformational learning techniques as well as extensive experiential formal and informal learning techniques will be employed through these courses. Students will be required to maintain an online portfolio, to make formal presentations in their community and to adhere to "service hours" requirements.

ADE 6285 (Masters/Specialist): Grant Writing and Program Management for Adult and Community Education and NonProfit Education

The course explores issues of public and private grant and contract competitions, organizational readiness for grant funded projects, how matches between funders and organizations and programs are made, the elements and structure of proposals and

applications. The course includes public sources (e.g., grants.gov, eRA commons, cybergrant platforms and traditional formats. Project management approaches, data collection and management reporting as well as close-outs for grants are illustrated.

ADE 6684: (Masters /Specialist): Geospatial Technologies for Community
Assessment, Planning, and Sustainability [This is a new course and Geomatics
Engineering has reviewed the course and made a number of revisions so it is compatible
with their offerings. We have made the adjustments. Based on course descriptions this
course is not duplicative of their courses or their certificate offerings. Qualified and
nationally rank ESRI ArcGIS (Geographic Information Systems) instructors will teach
this course. We hope that some of our students will also elect to take Geomatics courses
as well.

Adult and community educators, non-profit managers, school-based managers, environmental specialists are very aware of the inter-relationship between the how adults use location-based services including personal navigation, GPS, web-based mapping services, and social networks with real-time location information are commonly part of our everyday lives. These technologies are not only ubiquitous in our personal lives, but they are essential to the functioning of government, industry, community organizations, and non-profit sectors. This course will explore the technologies and societal implications of our digital planet with particular attention to geospatial technologies (e.g., Geospatial or GIS) that provide locational services, imagery, mapping and other capabilities. These technologies, ideally suited to analyze geographic patterns of sociological and environmental data, are rapidly evolving, with introductions of new applications every day.

This course provides an overview of evolving geospatial technologies, explores the impact of developments in geospatial technology on the individual and society, and questions how economics, politics, culture and values affect technological development. Through an examination of issues such as privacy, representation, geo-politics, surveillance, equity and social justice, students will obtain a better understanding of the benefits, challenges, ethics and risks of these technologies and will increase their awareness of their personal and societal implications.

ADE 6695: Sustainability Leadership for ACE Entrepreneurs & Change Agents Course Description (3 credit hours)

This course offers a comprehensive overview of the field of sustainability leadership and the best practices of starting and growing successful for-profit and nonprofit ventures. This field is rapidly garnering attention around the world from entrepreneurs, investors, corporations, foundations, and consulting firms, who have understood that the business-as-usual paradigm has ceased to offer a viable framework for wealth creation.

Sustainability leaders and entrepreneurs, in the private markets, are creating products and services that address the integration of social and environmental needs in line with competitive financial returns through their products, services and other business practices. Sustainability leaders and entrepreneurs in the nonprofit sector aim to do

likewise, but rather than make a profit for their company, elect to use the monies saved through sustainable practices to serve more people and deliver their services to wider audiences.

In either case these leaders are driven by at least three major goals.

- 1. The first, their core purpose, is to channel their personal passion for innovation and creativity into profitable enterprises that promote radically new, regenerative approaches to doing business. In the process, they make a positive impact on local and global communities.
- 2. Secondly, in order to fulfill their vision, they engage all their principal stakeholders in building business models that respond to real needs.
- 3. Finally, in order to become successful, these models must become financially profitable and scalable over time.

- 1. I've reviewed the three courses your Department has proposed, and see no conflict or overlap with the courses or curriculum in the ESE Department with ADE 6684 and ADE 6695.
- 2. There is considerable overlap with ADE 6285, your proposal for the grants course. The ESE Department has offered EEX 7526: Grant Writing for many years. Much of the content, as well as the work activities in your ADE course mirrors EEX 7526. In addition, students from your department and others have frequently enrolled in EEX 7526. To identify overlap, however, does not imply conflict. Your proposal for ADE 6285 also includes attention to program management, and the context for your Department's course rests within adult and community organizations. While there is overlap there as well, there are also differences between the two courses. I do not see conflict between the courses or programs, and the redundancy is not problematic from our perspective.
