Course Description: This course is an applied course in orchestral excerpts for violin, viola, cello or double bass. Specific repertoire will be determined by the applied lesson instructor. Students must also attend weekly string studio class.

Course Objectives

Students will:

- Obtain a specific audition list applicable to their performance area
- Prepare selections from the list for public performances in a studio class setting
- Analyze their selections in context of the full orchestral score
- Analyze their selections by comparing and contrasting video and audio performances of the selected repertoire
- Research published discussions of practice techniques as practicable
- Demonstrate practice processes in studio class
- Attend weekly string studio to present graded demonstrations to the string faculty panel in attendance
- Present a final graded juried exam during music juries to the panel of appropriate string faculty

Assignments

Performance exams (2) 30%: Student performs a graded exam 2 times during the semester as assigned by the applied teacher. These will take place in the string studio class.

Demonstrations (2) 15%: Student presents a demonstration of the selected excerpt for string studio class. Student will play a short sample of the excerpt in context (video or audio), discuss the practice techniques for preparing the excerpt, and demonstrate a portion to the studio.

Final jury 15%: takes place during the final strings jury period. Student prepares 3 orchestral excerpts for graded performance for a panel of string faculty.

Lesson preparation: 40% Student will be graded on weekly preparation for applied lesson. Each lesson session described in the course outline will focus on specific pedagogical and artistic feedback. Students are required to record one excerpt each week for discussion and analysis of improvement from previous sessions.
