COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Scoring for a variety of instrumental ensembles, with an emphasis on concert, film, and commercial music.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand idiomatic writing techniques of instruments in the standard orchestral and wind ensembles.
- 2. Employ arranging techniques in a variety of genres.
- 3. Understand the scope of writing for instrumental ensembles, including score editing, and music engraving practices.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

- Mussorgsky-Ravel: Pictures at an Exhibition in Full Score, The Masterworks Library Edition, by Mussorgsky/Ravel ISBN-10: 0-85162-387-5

HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS:

You will be given regular homework assignments based on the current score study assignment. For assignments to receive a grade, they must be completed and submitted when due. There are no late assignments. Only those that are completed and delivered on time will be graded and given credit.

MAJOR PROJECTS:

This course will have two major projects: one project will be a transcription of an existing piece, provided by the instructor, while the other will be an arrangement based upon preexisting material. One project will be scored for orchestra, while the other will be scored for wind ensemble. The university wind ensemble and orchestra may read through projects of a sufficiently high quality, as determined by the instructor and ensemble directors.

MIDTERM AND FINAL EXAM:

The midterm will cover topics introduced during score study during the first half of the semester. The final will be a cumulative exam. **Final Exam: TBD**

PROFESSIONALISM:

Being punctual, being prepared, participating in discussions, turning assignments in on time, etc. all reflect the student's professional demeanor in class. Failure to conduct yourself in a professional manner will impact this grade.

ATTENDANCE:

As much of this course relies on listening, discussion, and practice, attendance is paramount. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class period. Excused and unexcused absences are treated equally. Leaving early, or otherwise spending extended time out of class is counted as a tardy, which is equal to one-half an absence. You are allowed two free absences, after which your final grade will be reduced by five percent per additional absence.

The classroom door will be locked precisely at the beginning of class. Students not in class by this point will not be allowed in, and will be marked absent.
