PURPOSE: The purpose of this variable-topics one-credit graduate course is performance-based learning of world music ensemble tradition(s). Each semester the class will explore the music and culture of select genres chosen from the traditions of Africa, the Americas, and Asia.

GOALS:

- global perspective through the study of three different world music traditions
- the development of aural acuity and rhythmic skills
- experience with cooperative rhythmic and melodic performance practice
- cultural and historical perspective of the traditions studied

REQUIREMENTS: Prior musical experience is not required. Because of the hands-on nature of the course, students are required to attend and participate in all class sessions. The required text is: *Worlds of Music*, Jeff Todd Titon ed., 5th edition, Schirmer, 2008. Additional readings and texts will be assigned depending on the specific tradition studied. Students will participate in one or more outside class performances per semester. The instructor must be notified in writing (email) of all absences, both anticipated and unexpected.

EVALUATIONS: Students will be evaluated on attendance, participation, and musical acuity assessment for each class session, based on a ten-point weekly scale for a total of 150 points (attendance 50%, participation 25%, musical acuity assessment 25%). Points may be deducted for early/late departure/arrival and/or non-participation, subject to the discretion of the instructor. The final exam will included participation in a formal end-of-the-semester concert, which will act as a final examination (50 points). Final grades will be based on the following scale: A = 93-100%, A- = 90-92%, B+ = 87-89%, B = 83-86%, B- = 80-82%, C+ = 77-79%, C = 73-76%, C- = 70-72%, D+ = 67-69%, D = 63-66%, D- = 60-62%, F=below 60%.

CONDUCT: Students must be respectful, patient, and attentive in the classroom environment at all times. In accordance with the FAU Rules and Regulations (Student Handbook pp. 155-163), students are to refrain from disruptive conduct, falsifying attendance records, phone calls, text messaging, and internet surfing during class.
