The Interprofessional Education and Practice course is designed to provide developing speech-language professionals with the knowledge, skills, values, and ethics required to collaborate effectively in order to promote health and well-being of their patients, clients, families, and communities. Students participating in this course will complete Canvas modules (readings, PowerPoint presentations, self-study, quizzes and/or videos).
