Course Description

Introductory Analysis 1

Prerequisites: MAS 3156 with grade of "C" or better or permission of instructor Metric space topology, uniform convergence, Arzela-Ascoli theorem, differentiation and integration of single variable functions, power series, Stone-Weierstrass Theorem, measure theory, Lebesgue integral, convergence theorems for the Lebesgue integral, absolute continuity, the fundamental theorem of calculus.

Introductory Analysis is a two-course sequence whose main purpose is to teach the basics of analysis in a rigorous and reasonably complete way. In our current setup, Part I can be called Calculus of one

variable done right. Part II covers the basics of Lebesgue integration. Together with the Introductory Algebra sequence it is supposed to prepare students for more advanced courses in mathematics. In our doctoral program, the qualifying exams are designed (or supposed to be designed) to test your readiness for taking these advanced courses; an immediate consequence of doing well in the Analysis sequence is that you will also do well in the analysis qualifier. Of course, "doing well" does not mean simply getting a good grade, it means having understood the material, being able to prove the theorems, and being able to work most of the exercises on one's own. It may be useful to mention that writing carefully, expressing yourself in coherent sentences in the English language (both in writing and orally), understanding concepts, and proving theorems are essential ingredients of the course.

Course Evaluation Method

There will be regular homework assignments, and midterm exam, and a final exam. Course grades will be based on these. The grading scale is the standard one. That is, A > 89 > B > 79 > C > 69 > D > 59 > F. Homework will make up 60 percent of the course grade, the midterm 15 percent, the final 20 percent, and participation 5 percent.
