At the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, Caring Science is not just a philosophy; it is the driving force behind our vision for a healthier, more compassionate world. Our five-year blueprint, Rooted in Caring, Rising in Excellence: Our Promise, guides our efforts to transform nursing education, research, practice, and service across South Florida.

This year, the nurse-led Florida Atlantic University/Northwest Community Health Alliance Community Health Center became a federally funded Federally Qualified Health Center, expanding its capacity to serve families across its Westgate and U.B. Kinsey locations. The center recorded 5,459 patient visits in 2025, reflecting its growing role as a trusted source of accessible, relationship-centered care in the community.

The Louis and Anne Green Memory and Wellness Center, a state-designated Memory Disorder Clinic under Florida's Department of Elder Affairs' Alzheimer's Disease Initiative, exemplifies our commitment to holistic care. We expanded enrollment in our Adult Day Center and dramatically increased support for care partners, offering guidance and encouragement to those navigating memory disorders. Our approach honors the dignity and unique needs of every individual and family, creating a community where no one walks alone.

Our vision extends far beyond clinic walls. Our students, inspired by Caring Science, actively engage in health and education fairs throughout South Florida, conducting screenings and supporting back-to-school physicals. Twice a year, teams of students and faculty journey to remote regions of Guatemala, delivering primary care to hundreds. These experiences ignite a passion for service, foster cultural understanding, and shape nurses who are ready to lead with empathy and excellence on a global stage.

None of this would be possible without the unwavering support of our advisory board, community partners, and generous donors. Your belief in our mission fuels innovation, scholarships, and life-changing experiences. You empower us to be a college that leads with heart, advances healthcare, and uplifts communities through Caring Science.

BUILDING THE FUTURE OF HEALTHCARE:

CHRISTINE E. LYNN ADVANCED NURSING SIMULATION CLINIC EMPOWERS 2,000 STUDENTS ANNUALLY



Christine E. Lynn, the college's namesake philanthropist, has remained a steadfast advocate of nursing education for decades. To keep pace with the latest technological advancements, Lynn generously supported the state-of-the-art expansion of the college's simulation center on Florida Atlantic's Boca Raton campus. Named in her honor, the Christine E. Lynn Advanced Nursing Simulation Clinic benefits 2,000 nursing students each year, providing opportunities to apply classroom lessons in risk-free, real-life settings.

The new Boca Raton clinic, which opened in September 2025, features cutting-edge technologies and specialty units, including an emergency department bay with cots and high-fidelity mannequins, an Intensive Care Unit, medical-surgical suites, a labor and delivery room with a newborn stabilization unit, a birthing bed with a high-fidelity labor/delivery mannequin, a pediatric unit, and a home health and hospice room. In addition, the Boca Raton clinic has upgraded its infrastructure with advanced recording systems, enabling faculty to review simulation sessions and provide valuable feedback.

"It is my hope that this innovative clinic will help transform nursing education and give students the necessary high-tech and high-touch skills to improve patient outcomes in their future nursing careers," Lynn stated. "Undergraduate and graduate students will be able to practice essential skills like patient assessment, emergency care and obstetrics in a safe, but true-to-life clinical training environment."

The College of Nursing also provides students with hands-on training in a simulation lab on the Davie campus. In 2023, the Advanced Nursing Simulation and Clinical Learning Laboratory underwent significant renovations made possible through generous philanthropic support. The upgraded facility now features new high-fidelity simulators that offer immersive, hands-on training across a range of real-world clinical scenarios.

Like the Boca Raton lab, the Davie facility has also upgraded its infrastructure with enhanced audio-visual systems. Replacing existing cameras with higher-quality equipment has improved both audio and video clarity during simulations, further enhancing students' learning experiences.

As the College of Nursing expands to Florida Atlantic's Jupiter campus and prepares for its first cohort of students in fall 2027, plans are underway to develop a new simulation lab to support this growing academic footprint. The facility will serve students enrolled in the Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) and Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) tracks, providing advanced, hands-on clinical learning experiences in a state-of-the-art environment.

MARKS 25 YEARS OF SUPPORTING FAMILIES

For 25 years, the Louis and Anne Green Memory and Wellness Center at Florida Atlantic University's Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing has served as a lifeline for families navigating Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, providing specialized care, education and support throughout the community. The milestone was celebrated this spring during an open house that welcomed families, supporters and community partners to the center. Attendees toured the recently updated Adult Day Center and learned about new enhancements, including a Montessori-inspired curriculum designed to promote independence and engagement among participants.

As a state-designated memory disorder clinic, the center offers a comprehensive range of services for individuals living with memory disorders and the people who care for them. Services include comprehensive memory and wellness evaluations, neuropsychological testing, cognition-based driver evaluations, psychotherapy and counseling, care planning, education and support groups. Among its most impactful programs is the Adult Day Care Center, which provides cognitive, physical and social stimulation in a safe and supportive environment.



Participants engage in a variety of activities throughout the day, including reminiscence therapy, hand-eye coordination exercises, painting classes, chair aerobics, chair dancing, drumming, live music and educational presentations. Special events bring additional enrichment, from visits by miniature ponies and therapy dogs to interactive robotic cats that purr as part of the center's animal therapy program.

"We focus on meeting each person where they are and creating opportunities for meaningful engagement throughout the day," said Alice W. Brumley, DNP, APRN, AGPCNP-BC, director of the Louis and Anne Green Memory and Wellness Center. "Whether someone is sorting objects, playing basketball, participating in an art activity or enjoying music, these experiences help maintain abilities, promote confidence and support quality of life."

For many families, the program offers far more than daytime activities. Adult day care services provide care partners with time to work, attend appointments or simply rest while knowing their loved one is in a safe environment. The program can also help individuals remain in their homes longer, delaying or preventing the need for more costly long-term care options.

The center's impact is strengthened by the ongoing support of the Caring Hearts Auxiliary, a volunteer organization dedicated to raising funds and awareness for the Memory and Wellness Center. Through scholarships and fundraising efforts, the auxiliary helps make adult day care services more accessible to local families.

Additional support from the Boca Raton Regional Hospital Foundation and other community donors helps fund scholarships that allow participants to continue receiving services. The center also offers a variety of no-cost programs, including educational opportunities and support groups for care partners, both in-person and virtually.

"As part of the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, the Louis and Anne Green Memory and Wellness Center plays a vital role in advancing compassionate, person-centered care," said Cameron Duncan, dean of the college. "Celebrating 25 years of service is a testament to the center's lasting impact on families throughout our community. The MWC also serves as an invaluable learning environment for our nursing students, providing opportunities to develop the knowledge, skills and compassion needed to care for older adults and support their care partners."

This year also marks another milestone for the center and its supporters. The Caring Hearts Auxiliary will host the 20th annual "Keep Memories Alive" Walk-in-the-Mall this November at the Town Center in Boca Raton. The event, which has become a community tradition, raises funds for Adult Day Care Center scholarships and helps ensure families continue to have access to critical services for years to come.



FLORIDA ATLANTIC COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER EXPANDS ACCESS TO FAMILY HEALTHCARE IN WEST PALM BEACH

Florida Atlantic University's nurse-led community clinics are expanding access to comprehensive family health services in West Palm Beach by providing primary care, preventive services and community outreach.

The Florida Atlantic University Northwest Community Health Alliance (FAU/NCHA) Community Health Center, now a federally funded Federally Qualified Health Center, operates two locations in West Palm Beach: the U.B. Kinsey Educational and Community Center and the Westgate Community Health Center adjacent to Westgate Elementary School.

"For many working adults and families, convenience can make the difference between getting care and putting it off," said Cameron Duncan, dean of the College of Nursing and CEO of FAU/NCHA. "Our clinics offer same-day appointments and bring pediatric and primary care, mental health services and laboratory testing together under one roof, making it easier for patients to receive the services they need for themselves and their families in a single visit."



The clinics provide comprehensive, family-centered services for children, adults and older adults. Services include immunizations; management of diabetes and high blood pressure; school, sports and pre-employment physicals; foster care physicals; disability confirmation visits; vision and hearing screenings; and laboratory testing, including cholesterol and HIV screenings.

"Every patient visit represents a direct impact on a person or family in our community," said Monica Cleckley, DNP, director of the Community Health Center. "Whether we are helping someone manage a chronic condition, preparing a child for school, or identifying a health concern early, our goal is to provide care that improves health today and helps prevent more serious problems in the future."



In 2025, the FAU/NCHA recorded 5,459 patient visits, including a record 542 patients served in October alone. Services were provided at both clinic locations as well as through outreach efforts at Harmony House and Vita Nova. Throughout the year, clinic staff participated in community events by offering immunizations, blood pressure checks, mental health screenings and health education.

The team also provides weekly outreach at St. Patrick's Episcopal Church and hosted its first Back-to-School Community Health and Resource Fair on Aug. 8 in partnership with TLC Learning Center, Tabernacle Church, Bridges at West Palm Beach and the West Palm Beach Fire Department.

\$1.5M GIFT ADVANCES HOSPICE AND PALLIATIVE CARE NURSING EDUCATION

The Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing received a \$1.5 million gift from Mark Bruce Swillinger in memory of his wife, Marilyn Lee Swillinger, to establish an endowed professorship in hospice and palliative care nursing last fall. The Mark Bruce and Marilyn Lee Swillinger Endowed Professor will provide students with tailored instruction and guidance in these two specialized fields of care throughout their nursing education. Additional gifts totaling \$300,000 name the dean's conference room for Marilyn Lee Swillinger and the collaborative classroom for Mark and Marilyn together.

The endowed professorship will ensure hospice and palliative care are incorporated across the college's academic programs and support the development of clinical experiences in these specialized care settings. The need for hospice and palliative care is especially acute in Florida, where more than 21% of residents are age 65 or older, and that share is projected to reach 27% by 2030.



"With this gift, I wanted to honor Marilyn's memory and show our gratitude to a community that has supported us so deeply," said Mark Swillinger. "The compassionate care we received from hospice made a tremendous difference for both Marilyn and me. Expanding access to comprehensive palliative and hospice training will enable tomorrow's healthcare workers to better address the growing need for these critical services and deliver much-needed emotional and physical support within our community."

Marilyn Lee Swillinger passed away on Oct. 30, 2023, after a two-year battle with lung cancer. She was a committed advocate for healthcare, the arts and expanded educational opportunities. Marilyn was a founding member of the College of Nursing's advisory board in 2012 and remained a longtime member. In 2025, she was posthumously named an emerita advisory board member. She also strongly supported other Florida Atlantic colleges and departments, along with numerous local charitable organizations.

The Mark Bruce and Marilyn Lee Swillinger Endowed Professorship in Hospice and Palliative Care Nursing will provide support in perpetuity for a professor with expertise in these fields. The professor will lead the integration of hospice and palliative care throughout the undergraduate curriculum, including academics, simulation, clinical training and preparation for certification at all levels of hospice and palliative care. The role will also introduce students to these specialties early in their academic careers and prepare them for rewarding careers in these essential areas of nursing.

ENDOWED PROFESSORSHIPS HELP SHAPE THE NEXT GENERATION OF NURSING LEADERS

At the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, endowed professorships and chairs play a critical role in advancing nursing education, research and innovation at a time when colleges and universities across the country face an ongoing shortage of Ph.D.-prepared nursing faculty.

While many assume the national nursing shortage is driven by a lack of student interest, nursing programs across the country continue to see strong demand from qualified applicants. Barriers to accepting all students who apply include a limited number of doctoral-prepared faculty, limited availability of clinical placements, and a shortage of the other educational resources needed to train the next generation of nurses.

“Endowed professorships provide long-term support that strengthens a college’s ability to attract distinguished scholars, expand research initiatives and sustain academic excellence for generations to come. These funds create a permanent source of income that supports faculty leadership, scholarly work and innovation while enhancing the reputation and impact of both the college and the faculty members who hold these prestigious appointments.”

Competition for experienced nursing professors and researchers has intensified nationwide, making it increasingly difficult for academic institutions to recruit and retain top talent.

At the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, endowed positions help it compete nationally for leading nurse scientists, educators and researchers whose work shapes the future of healthcare.



Most recently, the college named Candy Wilson, Ph.D., associate dean for research and scholarship, as the inaugural holder of the Dr. Elizabeth E. Force Chair for Healthcare Research.

The endowed chair recognizes Wilson's leadership in advancing the college's research mission and strengthening its growing scholarly impact. The position was established through the estate of Elizabeth E. Force, whose gift was specifically designated to support the college's associate dean for research.

Force enjoyed a distinguished career as a biomedical researcher in the pharmaceutical industry and developed a close connection to the college after attending faculty research presentations at Abbey Delray South, where she was a resident. Inspired by the work of the college's faculty and the relationships she formed with nursing researchers and leadership, she became a dedicated supporter of the college and volunteered as a judge for faculty and student research poster presentations.

Her passion for healthcare research and meaningful community engagement ultimately led her to establish a legacy that will continue supporting nursing scholarship and innovation well into the future.

"I feel deeply honored to be associated with Dr. Elizabeth Force's name and legacy," Wilson said. "Her commitment to healthcare research and her engagement with our college speak to a remarkable vision. It is a privilege to carry forward Dr. Force's legacy while continuing to advance the college's strong tradition of research excellence and scholarly impact."



Through endowed chairs and professorships like the Dr. Elizabeth E. Force Chair for Healthcare Research, the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing continues to invest in the future of nursing education and research while creating lasting opportunities for faculty, students and the communities they serve.

BRINGING COMPASSIONATE CARE TO GUATEMALA

Each year, nurse practitioner students from Florida Atlantic University's Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing travel to rural Guatemala, where they provide essential healthcare while gaining transformative clinical and cultural experiences that shape them into compassionate, globally-minded providers.

Through a longstanding partnership with Nursing Heart, Inc., a nurse-led community health organization serving rural and Indigenous populations, the Guatemala program gives students the opportunity to experience nursing beyond the classroom while expanding access to primary and women's healthcare in underserved communities.

Founded on the belief that all people deserve access to dignified healthcare, Nursing Heart works to ensure families in Guatemala receive preventative care from medical professionals who treat them with empathy and kindness.

The program is open to students in the Family Nurse Practitioner, Adult-Gerontology Primary Care Nurse Practitioner and Nurse Educator programs through Florida Atlantic's Study Abroad Program. Faculty and students travel to Guatemala twice each year, in February and November.

"These experiences challenge students to think beyond traditional clinical settings," said Assistant Professor Nancy Harris, DNP, APRN, ANP-BC, FAANP, who leads the program. "They return with stronger clinical skills, greater cultural awareness and a deeper appreciation for the power of compassionate care."

In November 2025, nursing students and faculty worked in the villages of Los Jometes and San Martin Jilotepeque. The team cared for more than 500 primary care patients and nearly 75 women through cancer screening services. One patient with atypical cervical cells received onsite thermal ablation treatment to destroy precancerous cells.

During the February 2026 trip, nine nurse practitioner students, accompanied by faculty, provided care in the communities of San Juan Alotenango and Los Jometes, Chimaltenango. The team cared for 121 patients in the general clinic and 26 patients in the women's clinic, including one thermal ablation procedure to treat a precancerous cervical lesion. In Los Jometes, they cared for 199 patients in the general clinic and 39 patients in the women's clinic.

For Rachel Huerta, MSN '11, BSN '07, alumni involvement is an opportunity to remain part of a profession and community that continues to shape future generations of nurses.

"As nursing graduates, we are part of a distinguished community united by compassion, leadership, service, and commitment to Caring Science," said Huerta, a board member for Florida Atlantic's Alumni Association. "The connections we built during our time at Florida Atlantic created a lifelong network of professionals dedicated to making a difference in the lives of others."

Huerta said the Florida Atlantic Alumni Association gives graduates opportunities to support initiatives that strengthen nursing education and the profession as a whole.

"Alumni bring invaluable experience and perspective to our students," Muller said. "Their involvement helps strengthen the supportive community that defines the college."

The Nursing Professionals Alumni Network is free to join and offers graduates opportunities to remain involved with the college throughout their lives.

CARE GRANT LEAVES A LASTING LEGACY

IN COMMUNITY HEALTH

After nearly four years of expanding access to care and preparing future nursing leaders, the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing is celebrating the impact of the \$3.9 million federally funded grant, the Caring-based Community & Academic Relationships for Excellence (CARE): Nurse-led Mobile Health Unit.

Awarded by the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) in 2022, the grant was designed to increase access to primary care, behavioral health services, and preventive health education while strengthening the nursing workforce through community-based clinical education. Through the grant, 240 Florida Atlantic graduate and undergraduate nursing students gained hands-on experience serving rural and under-resourced communities across Palm Beach County while working alongside the FAU/NCHA clinical staff, faculty and community partners to address health inequities.

A portion of the grant's outreach occurred in the Glades communities, where students participated in more than 40 health education and screening events in partnership with local organizations, schools, churches and civic leaders. They also completed community health assessments and developed service-learning projects addressing topics such as heart health, diabetes management, dementia prevention, healthy aging, stress reduction and mental wellness.

"The CARE grant created meaningful opportunities for our students to learn by serving communities where access to care is often limited. These experiences prepared them to practice with compassion and competence while serving as community-focused nurse leaders."

"Working in the Glades gives students the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of the challenges many families face in accessing healthcare," said Lisa Kirk Wiese, Ph.D., MSN, RN, GERO-BC, PHNA-BC, CNE, FGSA, FAAN. "These communities benefit from sustained access to health education, screenings and preventive resources. The trust developed through this work has created a strong community-academic partnership that will continue well beyond the grant."

The CARE grant also expanded learning opportunities in communities throughout the West Palm Beach area. Students worked with community partners serving survivors of domestic violence, veterans, individuals experiencing homelessness, children and families, and residents of low-income housing.

In collaboration with interdisciplinary healthcare teams, students participated in medication management, health physicals, telehealth visits, mental health screenings and evaluations, patient education and care coordination.

For Goece Charles, RN, a community health nurse and BSN preceptor, one of the program's greatest strengths was showing students what nursing looks like beyond the bedside.

"The grant allowed students to experience nursing in the places where people live, work and seek support," Charles said. "They learned that improving health means more than treating illness; it requires building relationships, understanding community needs, and connecting people with resources that can improve their lives."

As the CARE grant concludes, its impact will continue through the hundreds of students who gained community-based clinical experience and the partnerships established throughout Palm Beach County.



PALM BEACH HEALTH NETWORK RE-ESTABLISHES NURSING SCHOLARSHIPS

THROUGH STATE MATCHING PROGRAM

In spring 2026, Palm Beach Health Network (PBHN) re-established its scholarship program to support undergraduate nursing students at the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing with \$10,000 scholarships. By leveraging the State of Florida's Linking Industry to Nursing Education (LINE) 1:1 matching program, the initiative effectively doubles the impact of each contribution and expands support for future nurses entering the workforce.

"This is one of several similar scholarships the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing has with hospital systems that provide critical financial aid for students and help build an employment pipeline with our clinical partners," said Dean Cameron Duncan.

Through this partnership, the scholarship will ultimately benefit 20 students completing externships across Palm Beach Health Network facilities. In return, recipients commit to two years of employment with PBHN following graduation and successful licensure, strengthening the pipeline between academic preparation and clinical practice.

"This partnership reflects our ongoing commitment to investing in the next generation of nurses who will serve our communities with skill and compassion," said Ricky Ramirez, MSN, RN, CCRN-K, CENP, NEA-BC, chief nursing officer for West Boca Medical Center and Palm Beach Health Network. "By supporting students during their training and welcoming them into our health system upon graduation, we are building a stronger, more sustainable nursing workforce."

"I am drawn to the opportunity to support mothers and families during one of the most meaningful moments of their lives," she shared, adding that L&D nurses balance compassion, advocacy, and critical thinking every day. "My goal is to become an L&D nurse who provides safe, patient-centered care while helping families feel empowered throughout the birthing experience."

An obstetrics clinical rotation solidified her career goals. Watching nurses advocate for patients, provide reassurance during emotional moments, and help bring new life into the world was incredibly inspiring.

"Through clinical experiences, coursework, and the support of faculty and peers, I've grown tremendously and become more certain that nursing is the right path for me," Caroline shared.

As she continues working toward her goal of becoming a registered nurse, Caroline remains grateful for the support she received through scholarship funding.

"This support provides more than financial assistance — it gives students encouragement, opportunity, and reassurance that others believe in their potential."
