Students must take four (4) WAC courses. Two (2) courses are to be taken from Foundations of Written Communication. We strongly recommend the two additional WAC courses come from these courses: PHI 2010, WOH 2012, LIT 2010, LIT 2030, LIT 2040 and LIT 2070. See advisor for additional details.

Civic Literacy Requirement

Beginning in Fall 2018, students entering a Florida public institution as a degree-seeking student for the first time needs to demonstrate civic literacy through either taking a certain course (AMH 2020 or POS 2041) or passing an assessment exam. Beginning in Summer 2021, Florida Legislature amended the statute and now requires students to complete both a civic literacy course (AMH 2020 or POS 2041) and an assessment



FAU Civic Literacy Requirement

To graduate from FAU with any degree, students must meet the Florida Civic Literacy statue by completing **both a course and exam**.

Courses	Civic Literacy Exam Requirement
AP, AICE, or IB U.S. Government or History credit	Requirements change based on credit type; consult with your Academic Advisor
50 or higher on American Gov. CLEP exam	Civic Literacy Requirement is met
Passing grade in POS 2041 (Government of the U.S.) or AMH 2020 (U.S. History since 1877)	Must take Exam and score 60 or higher: U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services Naturalization Test or Florida Civic Literacy Examination (FCLE)
