I write this letter in strong recommendation of Dr. Ilaria Serra's nomination for the 2017 Distinguished Mentor of the Year (DMOY) award: Excellence in Undergraduate Research and Inquiry. Dr. Serra is dedicated, passionate and energetic about enhancing undergraduate research at Florida Atlantic University. I believe her efforts in this regard deserve high recognition.

Dr. Serra engages students in undergraduate research by incorporating research into her undergraduate classes as well as by directing independent and experiential undergraduate research projects. In class, Dr. Serra has involved students in research through developing a research question to be referenced throughout the class and encouraging students to further develop this research and present it at the Spring 2018 OURI Conference. During another class she facilitates students' writing of a collective research article, focusing on a different topic each time the course is taught, this article is published in an Italian newspaper of Venice.

Outside of the classroom, Dr. Serra is equally involved in undergraduate research and inquiry. Dr. Serra runs a study abroad program to Italy every summer, during which time she supervises directed independent research studies. One of these research projects was funded by OURI-SURF in 2016. In another project Dr. Serra collaborated with a team of undergraduate students to translate Venetian art works and interview their authors. She presented this project at the 10th Annual Florida Statewide Symposium on Best Practices in Undergraduate Research.

I believe her dedication and interest in undergraduate research is demonstrated by her taking on these mentorships in her own time, as well as by the varied and multiple successes of her undergraduate students. To the Committee for the 2017 Distinguished Mentor of the Year Award (DMOY):

Thank you for considering my application for this Award. Beyond designing and teaching new undergraduate and graduate courses, I am involved with my students in multiple ways, and I would be happy to see them recognized. Please, pass by my office and take a look at my office door, and you will see many of the faces of the students I mentored. Their smiling pictures are a constant reward.

My mentoring philosophy is based on two main assumptions: the best way to involve students in research are, first, by tying my own research to their interest to expose them to a contagious curiosity; and, second, by *plunging* them in practical project-based work that can be measurable and visible for all. These two aspects are particularly important for undergraduate students who are still growing as scholars and need a stronger motivation to face the necessary work.

The variety of fields, types of project, and the creative thinking behind each of them are the points of strength of my mentorship. I do not have huge numbers of students to boast (Italian students are not many, even though I just added the students of a World Literature class), but a do have a very wide variety of projects that involve students in many ways, all individually tailored. I have a hard time myself keeping track of all of them, because they are not directly part of any formal "assignment", but they are all self-added tasks. I will reflect now on my undergraduate mentoring, but graduate mentoring is also a part of my assignment and extra-work.

All my classes go beyond simple teaching the subject matter. They all include a specific project. Last fall, the class of LIT2100 (Intro to World Literature) did not only read and comment world literature, but engaged students with a research question: "Can the labyrinth be an overarching metaphor to read multiple pieces of world literature?" The students not only tied all their written assignment to this topic, but also prepared five research posters to present at the next Spring OURI Conference in Spring 2018.

During this class, students were asked to exit the class environment and be exposed to the larger world: when reading *Bhagavad Gita* we had an Indian scholar come to class and we participated to the Diwali festival in Boynton Beach. For *Tao Te Ching* we had an American Taoist monk speak to the class; for *Don Quixote*, a Quixote scholar; for Matsuo Basho's *haiku*, the students were invited to write their own haiku while walking the Nursing building labyrinth, and were also invited to a Japanese tea ceremony. This kind of extra work to engage students with the subject matter is part of my mentorship effort.

Another example of the connection I strive to offer between teaching and outreach is my class "Reading the Italian Press." At the end of semester, students see their names printed on an Italian newspaper of Venice, where they publish their own collective article on the customs of churches in South Florida ("Messe trilingui, uscieri e tanta musica nelle liturgie delle chiese cattoliche in Florida," *Gente Veneta*). The last article is now hanging on my office door, and it attests to the learning outcome of this class: not only reading and discussing Italian articles, but also producing one, with all the stylistic tricks students had learned in the semester.

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I am teaching "Reading the Italian Press" again this semester, and we have our work cut out to produce another newspaper article, on climate change and Florida. Not only, but this year, the whole class will hone their translating abilities by working on a specific project: the subtitles for a movie on recent immigration to Venice, produced by the local Venetian government. The names of FAU students will be listed in the credits of "Un posto altrove" by Andrea Onori and Luca Sella. The movie will be projected and followed by Skype interview with the authors on April 9 at FAU.

My Italian Advanced classes have been involved in Academic Service Learning projects that takes them outside the classroom. Students have the opportunity to be useful to the community though their Italian language skills: at the FAU Tutoring Center; as leaders of an Italian club for elementary children at A.D. Henderson Elementary School; the Mae Volen Center, the Saint Joan of Arc Columbiettes, and the FAU Green Memory and Wellness Center.

I am particularly interested in connecting my students with the outside world. The best example is the Summer Program in Venice, Italy, that I designed from scratch and have been leading for 9 years, serving not only our students but also the students of the College of Science and the School of Urbanism and Architecture.

The class, "Venice and Its Reflections," is designed for this program with a textbook that I created myself (a future publication project). The large part of my work in Venice is devoted to "teaching" Italian culture outside the classroom. This goes well beyond my responsibility as program leader and a teacher. It includes extraactivities such as meetings with local authors and personalities, help in joining the cathedral choir, auditing classes of the EU Erasmus project, and participating in socially meaningful activities (we participate in a local project to clean the walls of Venice from graffiti, mask-making in a center for youth with disabilities).

In Venice, some students take independent studies with me – one was funded by OURI-SURF in 2016. So far, I have worked in several projects: a radio program with Jillian Herman (2016); a OURI research with Colleen Nelson in 2016; and three undergraduate independent studies courses. Dominic Santoya and Alberto Gonzales, Stella Alves worked on translating Venetian art works and interviewing their authors. I presented this particular project at the last OURI conference in Orlando ("Broadening Participation in Undergraduate Research," 10th Annual Florida Statewide Symposium: Best Practices in Undergraduate Research).

In Venice, I also find volunteering opportunities that will enrich the student's CV. To mention just one: Brenda Theodore volunteered at a cat shelter in Venice, and now is in Veterinary school. This intense effort is one of the reasons why our program is always successful. I am now I the process of applying for a new SURF project with Hristo Joseph, Daniela Rozman and Angela Dalton for Summer 2018.

Involvement outside the classroom is crucial for my mentorship philosophy: I am the advisor of the Italian Club Insieme (every semester I organize a good number of events, I lead all movie presentations, and I am present to all conversation meetings). Last year, I set up the Italian Honor Society Gamma Kappa Alpha. I also helped set up two agreements to send our students to Italy as teacher of ESL after their graduation (SITE program and Piedmont Network).

I am also directly involved in raising money towards scholarships to help our students who often juggle between jobs and studying, both graduate and undergraduate. I added the following scholarships: TomDiSalvo (forthcoming), Thomas McCormick, Order of the Sons of Italy, Tony Colella, P.E.O., Sister Cities, and Papi Simonetti.

As you can see in my CV, I strive to include mentorship and bettering of undergraduate teaching strategies in my research through articles, book chapters and presentations.

It was my privilege and honor to work with Dr. Ilaria Serra on my undergraduate research project "Living in a Dying City. Loss and Preservation of Venetian Culture in the Face of Disaster: Rising Sea Level and Mass Tourism" during the summer of 2016. Dr. Serra has a true passion for her work and she did everything in her power to facilitate my research activities, providing me with support and supervision as needed, but also freedom and independence in pursuit of my academic goals.
