



Concentration in legal history (15 credits)

The FAU department of history now offers a concentration in legal history, particularly suited for majors with interest in this area and/or those who intend to pursue a career in law. Courses in the concentration invites students to learn about the history of law from its inception through the modern era. Upon completion of the track, students should be prepared not only to make decisions about law school, but to also seek justice in our rapidly changing world.

Students must take three core courses, and choose two from the list of elective courses.
