Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management (fau.edu/student)

The Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management inspires a collaborative working relationship with students, faculty, staff and the greater university community. The Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management is the chief student affairs officer for the University.

Dean of Students (fau.edu/dean)

The Dean of Students Office includes both the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution, Victim Services and student care/case management services. The Office strives to facilitate inclusive, civil, productive, value based participation in the FAU community through advocacy services and restorative justice practices. The office oversees the Exceptional Circumstances Withdrawal (ECW) process, and facilitates both the Beyond Food Program and the homeless verification process. Through this office, a student can receive assistance and/or a referral when an extenuating circumstance prevents them from succeeding academically.

Office of Leadership Education And Development (LEAD)

The Office of LEAD follows its mission to invest in students to become change agents. LEAD is committed to providing an atmosphere that fosters learning, personal growth, and exploration of individual and group leadership skills. LEAD offers many opportunities to enhance a student's curricular and co-curricular experience. Through partnerships with Academic Affairs, the Leadership Studies Minor with related courses, such as LDR 2010: Introduction Leadership, are offered for students. Co-curricular opportunities consist of many programs such as the iLead Student Leadership Conference, WeLead: Diversity Matters Student Leadership Symposium, the Elite Owl Leadership Ambassadors, the Certified Student Leader program, along with leadership development workshops for students and non-students and more.

LEAD promotes service through the Daniel B. Weppner Center for Civic Engagement and Service-Learning. The Weppner Center provides students the opportunity to combine coursework with the needs of the community and practice servant leadership through action and reflection, leading to meaningful experiences. Programs consist of Owl Breaks (alternative breaks), service projects, civic engagement, themed Days of Service events, and non-partisan voter education. Volunteer hours served at any nonprofit agency while an FAU student is currently enrolled can be recorded on the student's transcript through NobleHour. The Student Government program, Students Advocating Volunteer Involvement (SAVI), which provides students with service opportunities is advised through the Center.

Through these engagements, students develop their abilities through our guiding principles of Know, Be, Do, and Inspire to discover, process, and align their knowledge and self-awareness through finally, mobilizing others in their communities to create positive change.

Broward Campus Life enhances the overall educational experiences of students by providing comprehensive and integrated campus life events and programs, services and facilities that challenge and support FAU students through the promotion of academic success and student development. Relevant and desirable outcomes also relate to the goals of career readiness, leadership, wellness and life skills. Campus Life for the Davie and Fort Lauderdale campuses and the Dania Beach Research Center are coordinated through the Student Affairs & Enrollment Management offices on the Davie campus.

The Office of Campus Life, Northern Campuses supports the university's academic mission through meaningful co-curricular and experiential learning opportunities for students attending the MacArthur Campus, the Harriet L. Wilkes Honors College, and the Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute. As an entity within the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management, the Office of Campus Life provides students with a wide range of programs, services, and resources aimed at holistically supporting students from admission through graduation and beyond.

The Career Center connects Florida Atlantic University students with meaningful employment, internship and graduate school opportunities through innovative career programming and career advising. Center for Global Engagement (fau.edu/global)

The Center for Global Engagement was established in 2016 as a hub for international activities and global engagement efforts and in support of the Global Perspectives and Participation platform of the university strategic plan. Reporting to the Provost Office, Center for Global Engagement supports the development, promotion, and advocacy for a globally diverse university community and culture, by fostering an inclusive and supportive environment through innovative global exchange, competence, and outreach.

Education Abroad: This office coordinates long and short-term study abroad programming, manages the University's international agreements and partnerships, and represents FAU within the field of international education. FAU Education Abroad administers and oversees credit-bearing study abroad programming and provides general support services to students engaging in University-affiliated travel abroad. FAU Education Abroad advises students and faculty on fellowship and grant opportunities for overseas study and research; it also coordinates activities for the Peace Corps Prep Certificate Program. Education Abroad activities seek to increase access to global engagement not only through global travel, but also through virtual exchanges and other opportunities that provide a global experience with or without the need for physical travel.

International Student Services: The office is responsible for providing a full suite of support services to international students, scholars and their dependents. These services include issuance of forms I-20 and DS-2019 for F and J visa non-immigrant visa holders, reporting and record maintenance in SEVIS (Student and Exchange Visitor Information System), providing pre-arrival and onboarding support to international students, implementing programs and activities that support cultural adjustment and transition to life in the U.S., and signature events such as International Education Week and the Festival of Nations. The office is also

responsible for the International Integration Initiative (I3 @ FAU), which facilitates integration of international students into FAU campus life, and targets programming that allows U.S. and international student opportunities for learning and interactions.

Intensive English Institute: This department provides instruction in all areas of academic English for International students and scholars. The academic track offers conditional admission to qualified international applicants for admission to FAU. Additionally, the department collaborates with the College of Education and the College of Arts and Letters to offer research and experiential learning opportunities to graduate and undergraduate students.

Global Academic Services: This unit is responsible for facilitating several processes that support international and global functions at the university: Foreign Credential Evaluations (in-house services for evaluating academic credentials obtained at non-U.S. institutions); Sponsored Student Services

(advising and support for international students who receive sponsorship from their home governments); and International Alumni Engagement (a new initiative to connect with international graduates who wish to remain connected with the Center for Global Engagement.

International Employee and Scholar Services: This provides regulatory guidance and overall support to FAU departments who seek to sponsor foreign nationals requiring visa sponsorship, or who plan to invite international researchers, faculty and interns to participate in academic opportunities at FAU.

Center for Inclusion, Diversity Education, and Advocacy (IDEAs)(fau.edu/diversity)

The Center for Inclusion, Diversity Education, and Advocacy (IDEAs) highlights the experiences of traditionally marginalized groups through intentional interactions aimed at fostering awareness and cultivating new perspectives.

By offering quality programs and educational opportunities to all students, we create a campus climate that values differences and promotes equity. The center is comprised of the following four offices:

The Office of Hispanic/Latina/o/x Initiatives aim to connect Hispanic/Latina/o/x students to support services, resources and programs that prepare them for academic success and future careers. The FUTUROS Success Program provides Hispanic/Latina/o/x students with services and resources such as advising, mentorship, financial assistance, and career support.

The Office of LGBTQ+ Initiatives and Allyship seeks to create an affirming and equitable campus climate for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning and Ally (LGBTQ+) students. We provide training, educational, and social programming to FAU students, faculty, and staff. The office aims to foster a visible network of support by coordinating inclusionary efforts across campus.

The Office of Diversity Education and Training aims to foster an inclusive environment through diversity and inclusion training and educational programs. The office collaborates with units across the university to create an institutional climate of inclusive excellence that promotes awareness, social justice, and advocacy.

The Office of Black Student Success and Initiatives (OBSSI) aims to connect students of the African Diaspora at FAU to support services, initiatives, programs and resources that prepare them for success beyond graduation.

The Office of International Student Support seeks to engage international students and scholars for the purpose of providing a full and positive American university experience through educational, cultural, social, and service engagement opportunities.

The Office of First-Generation Student Success

Serves as a referral hub to the various services that exist to inspire and assist first-generation students at Florida Atlantic University, including academic support, advising, financial assistance and scholarships, mentorship, and the “First and Proud” registered student organization.

Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) (fau.edu/counseling) 561-297-CAPS

FAU’s Counseling and Psychological Services helps students with a wide range of social, emotional, and academic concerns. Fraternity and Sorority Life (fau.edu/fslife)

Membership in a fraternity or sorority is a good first step toward enjoying all the benefits that FAU has to offer. Collectively, fraternities and sororities constitute one of the largest student populations on campus. Fraternities and sororities are about lifelong friendships, scholarship, community service, leadership, and peer accountability. At their core, fraternities and sororities offer the opportunity for experiences that can enrich a life on campus and beyond. Many leaders of today, including here at FAU, are members of fraternities or sororities. The mission of the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution is to promote a safe

and secure university community of civility, integrity, and student development, as well as responsible, healthy behavior.

Owls Care Health Promotion (fau.edu/owlscare)

Owls Care Health Promotion (OCHP) empowers students to be healthy, responsible, and successful by providing wellness information, dynamic programs, and services on health-related issues such as stress management; healthy lifestyle; sexual health and well-being; substance safety; healthy relationships; women and gender equity; and much more. These services enhance the health of our FAU community and increase opportunities for students' academic and personal success.

OCHP hosts The Women and Gender Equity Resource Center, a student space that works towards advancing gender equity, educating the campus community, and promoting a safe and inclusive environment that supports student learning and development for all constituents facing gender-based oppression.

Women and Gender equity means everyone of ALL genders having access to the resources and support they need to achieve success. Access to menstrual products, lactation spaces, and gender affirming health care are all examples of what gender equity looks like at FAU.

SG also offers travel funding opportunities and access to free scantrons and blue books to students weekly.

Student Health Services provides high quality, affordable and accredited healthcare to registered FAU students at the Boca Raton, Jupiter, and Davie campuses. Our student-focused services offer a primary care solution to both commuter and residential students. We believe that a student's health and their ability to thrive academically are closely linked. It is the goal of our dedicated team of professionals to provide caring, confidential health and dental care and credible health information to help our students stay healthy, graduate on time, and establish lifelong health habits. Students who pay the FAU health fee are eligible for services and have access to our self-pay discounts. No payment is required at the time of service; any charges will be sent to your student account. Center. Finally, there are plans to open a new Student Marketplace with a coffee shop in 2022! As a new student, one of your first University experiences will be attending Orientation which is hosted here in the Student Union. As a graduating student, your last University experience will be walking across the Performing Arts center stage here at the Union for your graduation from FAU! GENERAL INFORMATION:

Student Code of Conduct (Regulation 4.007) (fau.edu/regulations/chapter4)

FAU's Student Code of Conduct promotes a safe and secure university community focused on civility, integrity, and personal responsibility. The code outlines procedures that provide fairness in the student conduct process and clarifies expectations related to student accountability. The code encourages the development of students as global citizens.

Statewide Articulation Agreement

Articulation ensures that students receive credit for comparable coursework without unnecessary repetition when transferring from one institution to another.

Florida has developed a seamless articulation system to facilitate efficient and effective progression and transfer of students between and among public postsecondary institutions.

Office of the Ombuds (fau.edu/ombuds)

Office of the Ombuds: We are listening. The Ombuds works toward resolving problems, not as an advocate for individuals or the University but as a neutral party. Because the Ombuds reports to the President's Office, the Ombuds has access to information from any office within the institution. The Ombuds works toward an informal resolution of issues, provides coaching, and option development. The office is informal and does not generate records, take legal notice nor accept official complaints; however, the office can assist you by making appropriate referrals if this is your intent. Your visit to the Ombuds is confidential except when there is a concern about danger to you, to others or in cases of Title IX matters. If, as an aid to resolution, it is necessary to disclose your identity and your specific issue to gain essential information, you and the Ombuds will discuss this and determine the limits of confidentiality. You should visit the Office of the Ombuds if you need assistance with disputes about fees, academic concerns, grade reviews, housing issues, parking problems, red tape, and many other matters.

An appointment with the Ombuds can be made by calling 561-297-3693. The Office of the Ombuds is located in the Student Service Building (SS-8, Room 226-F) within the Dean of Students suite.

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) education:

The human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) attacks the immune system and can lead to acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS). HIV can be transmitted through blood, pre-seminal fluid, semen, rectal fluids, vaginal secretions, and breast milk. One of the most common routes of HIV transmission is through unprotected sexual intercourse with a partner infected with HIV.
