Course description: Readings in Intermediate-Advanced Italian is the introduction to the higher levels of the Italian language sequence. It can be repeated for credits. It gives emphasis on communication skills, with a special attention to grammar explanations and practice. This class presents a felicitous blend of speaking and reading exercises as well as a variety of in-class activities that will build upon previously studied materials. As the class reunites students of multiple levels, the activities and the assignments may be diversified according to the level and may vary according to the many opportunities the Italian life in South Florida offers.

Course objectives: This course is aimed at further developing the students' ability to master the four "skills:" reading, listening, speaking, and writing Italian. However, since "skill" connotes the mere technicalities of the language, language as merely fulfilling a practical function, at this level we shall also

go beyond the notion of language as skill and study the Italian language as a vehicle for imparting notions of culture while drawing attention to its inner mechanisms and nuances. With this purpose in mind, we shall, on the one hand, enter into more sophisticated uses of grammar and syntax already studied; on the other, equip students with the linguistic tools for articulating more complex sentences both in speaking and in writing and hone their reading and listening skills through carefully selected reading and listening comprehension exercises.
