<u>Course description:</u> Course covers cellular neuroscience with a focus on human neurological diseases and disorders. Lectures provide the basic knowledge about cellular and molecular neuroscience and link them to the pathology of neurological diseases and disorders.

<u>Course Objectives:</u> The objective it for the students to know and understand common cellular and molecular mechanisms, principles and pathways that are relevant to neuronal processes and neurological diseases.

**Course format:** Method of instruction: Lectures, classroom discussion, exercises and assignments.

## **Course evaluation method:**

Participation and assignments: 10% of the final grade.

**Exams:** Best four out of 5 exams (each 20% of the final grade) given during the course period will count

for a total of 80% of the finale grade.

Mini Talks: 10% of the final grade

Extra credit: Up to 5% of the final grade extra credit can be earned with in class assignments.

### Policy on makeup tests, late work, and incompletes:

Missed Exams: At the end of the semester there will be an <u>optional fifth cumulative final exam</u>, which will cover the entire material from the entire semester. The final exam can be used as a make-up exam for a missed exam or to improve the grade. No additional make-up exams will be offered! If your final exam score does not improve your grade, it will be ignored.

**Incomplete Grade**: Consistent with FAU policy, an incomplete grade will only be given to a student who fulfills **all** of the following criteria:

- 1. Misses the 2 exams, both due to an FAU approved emergency
- 2. Has a grade of C or better
- 3. Submits evidence of the emergency and signs an incomplete agreement
