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COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Advanced study of the principles of modern scene design for the theatre. This course offers an in-depth exploration of the elements and principles of design with a focus on conceptualization and problem solving. Students expected to employ the professional design process used to create scenic designs for theatre productions-:extensive analysis of the text, visual research, perspective drawing, technical drawing and scale model construction will be completed for each project.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. The student will be able to use the elements of design and principles of composition to create innovative and dynamic scenic designs.
- 2. The student will be able to discuss, analyze and address the needs for successful scenic design for a variety of different types of performance (musicals, opera and dance).
- 3. The student will be able to create technical documents, sketches, perspective drawings, renderings and models and will be able to communicate and discuss their ideas about the design.
- 4. The student will be able to demonstrate advanced skills in sketching, drafting and use of multiple mediums.

- Three tardies, will equal one absence.
- Chronic absences or tardies will result in a "recommendation to withdraw."

LATE WORK AND MAKEUP QUIZZES:
