Course Description

This course provides an in-depth analysis of key issues and problems of international monetary economics and policy. We are going to cover the characteristics of the foreign exchange market and a modern theory of day-to-day exchange rate determination. We will learn the country level accounting of output, income and wealth in the Balance of Payments. We will understand how the goods and service market and foreign exchange market interact, and how governments conduct monetary policies. The emphasis of the course will be on the conceptual framework of international economic transactions and relations. A fair amount of time will be spent on developing the necessary analytical tools to address current international economics issues. There will be extensive use of graphical analysis and algebra will be utilized.

Instructional Method

This class is designated as “Primarily Classroom”. Less than 50% of the course is delivered online. Instructor will live stream the class for remote synchronous attendance. Our course will meet in person or you can attend remotely on Wednesdays 6:30pm-9:20pm via Zoom.

Prerequisites

ECO 3203 Minimum Grade of C

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

At the end of semester, students should be able to explain what determines exchange rates and how fiscal and monetary policies might influence exchange rates and to discuss various current issues related to international relations between countries.

COVID-19 Statement

Course Evaluation Method

- 1) Achieve Assignments: They will account for 30% of your final grade. Due dates will be on Exam dates. You may work with other students in solving the problems, but each student must turn in his/her own homework and **late assignments will be accepted at 20% penalty**. The goal is to learn the material, not simply to complete the assignments.

Every chapter has multiple assignments. Make sure you answer all of them.

- 2) Exams: There will be four exams. Each of the first three exams will be 15% of your final grade. Final Exam is cumulative and will be 25% of your final grade. Exams will be in multiple choice format.

Policy on Makeup Tests, Late Work, and Incompletes

All exams must be taken at the scheduled time and date. Any excusable absence must be documented by a verifiable source **at least one week** prior to the exam, or **within 24 hours** after the exam for emergencies. Unexcused or undocumented absences are subject to penalty. Unexcused absences include the inability to leave work, oversleeping, minor illnesses, fatigue, etc.

Late assignments are subject to 20% penalty per day.

A student who is passing a course, but has not completed all work due to exceptional circumstances, may, with consent of the instructor, temporarily receive a grade of incomplete ("I"). The assignment of the "I" grade is at the discretion of the instructor, but is allowed only if the student is passing the course.

The specific time required to make up an incomplete grade is at the discretion of the instructor. However, the College of Business policy on the resolution of incomplete grades requires that all work required to satisfy an incomplete ("I") grade must be completed within a period of time not exceeding one calendar year from the assignment of the incomplete grade. After one calendar year, the incomplete grade automatically becomes a failing ("F") grade.
