2. Instructional Method

You will need to have a computer (or laptop), a reliable WIFI access, and a webcam and microphone connected to your computer for this course. This class consists of lectures and labs, which are conducted in-class and/or live using Webex or Zoom, and recorded so students can watch the lectures and do the labs at a later time and date. The in-class delivery might be converted to fully online subject to the COVID 19 situations as the semester progresses. Students will be accommodated as much as possible with their needs during the pandemic. After two full weeks of face to face instruction with consecutive 'no show' of any students in person in the classroom, the modality of this course may be changed to remote instruction only at the discretion of the university.

In the event you might not have a computer, there is a Laptop Loaner Program at FAU for first-generation, low-income students.

The course deals with basic engineering laboratory methods and techniques with experiences in measurements, experiment planning, data recording, and laboratory report preparation. Five major lab experiences, including at sea experiences, are included.

Quiz/Exam Instruction

Instruction before Quiz/Exam

- 1. Do not wear sunglasses or a cap
- 2. Do not wear any head-set
- 3. Sharpen your pencil and have a spare one just in case
- 4. Use the restroom before you start since you may not be out of camera view during the quiz
- 5. Make sure you have a calculator, a pencil, eraser, the quiz instruction paper, and enough blank papers with you before starting the quiz
- 6. Set up an alarm using your cell phone so that it goes off 5 minutes before the end of the quiz.
- 7. Make sure your camera and mic are working, and the camera has enough resolution to show your work clearly (part of the Webcam test)
- 8. Find a location where your face (together with the blank papers, desk, and a calculator) can be seen by the camera during the entire quiz time. That means, the camera might be 3-4 feet in front or on the side of you



- 9. Start the lock-down browser
- 10. Show to the camera all the papers (both sides) that you have are blank
- 11. Show your calculator to the camera so I know it is a scientific calculator instead of a cell phone

Instruction during Quiz/Exam

- 1. Show to the camera your face, papers, and calculator during the entire quiz. Do not just show your face to the camera
- 2. Write down all the steps legibly so that they can be scanned clearly later on
- 3. When the alarm goes off, show all your work to the camera. Place each paper 4 inches in front of the camera. Show the top part while holding it in place for 5 seconds, then the middle part, and finally the bottom part. Repeat this process if you have more than 1 page of work.

Instruction after Quiz/Exam

- 1. Scan all your work (black and white) using your cell phone or a scanner if you have one. Scan all the pages into a SINGLE pdf file. There are many apps that provide this function. An example is Notebloc for both Apple and Android phones.
- 2. Upload the single pdf file to the Assignment folder on Canvas by the due time
