Course Pre-requisites: Placement test required with a passing score. (The test only needs to be taken once at FAU.)

Course Description An advanced conversation class designed to develop students' ability to communicate more fluently in Spanish and discuss a wide variety of cultural topics relating to Spain and Latin America.

Speaking Spanish is key to improving your language skills. This course emphasizes speaking fluency. With this goal in mind, the course will also provide exposure to the other language skills -reading and listening-comprehension, writing, vocabulary acquisition, cultural competence-,

which are integral to developing speaking fluency. This course is not open to heritage learner students or Spanish native speakers.

Course Objectives

- 1. Increase oral skills in formal and familiar situations.
- 2. Review of target grammar points and enrich vocabulary.
- 3. Acquire some basic notions of film analysis
- 4. Increase Hispanic cultural awareness through films from Spain and Latin America
- 5. Improve how to select, organize and use appropriate evidence or information to suit a specific or targeted audience.



Time commitment per credit hour

This course has 3 credit hours. For traditionally delivered courses, not less than one (1) hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction each week for fifteen (15) weeks per Fall or Spring - semester, and a minimum of two (2) hours of out-of-class student work for each credit hour. In a three-credit online class this translates to an average of eight (8) hours per week reading, listening, and doing homework.

Course Requirements

• Attendance & participation: Perfect attendance is expected and one absence is permitted. More than one absence will adversely affect a portion of your class participation and it can constitute a lowering of the grade by one or more levels. Two late arrivals or early departures will count as one absence. Absence due to illness, death in the family, or court appearance will be excused upon approval of the instructor and presentation of a valid and prompt documentation. It is the student's responsibility to present these documents to the instructor. In the case of extended health or personal problems it is essential that you inform the instructor as soon as possible. Active class participation during the course is expected and required. Students must participate actively and consistently in class activities as well as ask question and provide response to oral presentations given by classmates. There is a correlation between missed classes and class participation.

If you miss class, it is your responsibility to check with the instructor or a classmate to see if you missed an announcement or a schedule change made in class.

- <u>Homework</u>: Complete assignment activities. No late assignments will be accepted unless you provide professor with official written documentation that may be verified (e.g., illness, death, court appearances). Completion of all assigned work, oral and written, reading and creative assignments, and vocabulary preparation for each class are expected.
- Quizzes: There will be nine written and listening comprehension short quizzes during the semester, but the instructor will take only into consideration eight of them, disregarding the one with the worst grade. Student will take the quiz at the beginning of class. Please, don't be late. If a student is late and misses the quiz, a grade of "0" will be assigned.
- <u>Initial Oral Report</u>: Students will present one short individual oral presentation of 3-4 minute at the beginning of the semester to allow the professor to establish a starting point for students' language skills and help each student to elaborate personal goals for the semester. The professor must approve the topic.
- <u>Film Discussions</u>: Students will introduce the movie of that week through a 10-12 minute oral presentation. Students will provide a list of sources conform to MLA bibliographic standards and conventions. They will open a film discussion with two questions to their classmates.
- <u>Mid-term Oral Presentation</u>: Students will do group presentations based on one cultural aspects under the "Investigación" section that comes with each movie. Each group should have 2



students and each student should speak for 12-15 minutes. Students will provide instructor with a list of sources conform to MLA bibliographic standards and conventions. The rest of the class will take notes during these presentations and ask questions afterwards.

- <u>Interview</u>: Students will conduct interviews in Spanish about cultural differences and give an oral report on it.
- <u>Final Oral Presentation</u>: Students will do an individual final presentation of 15-20 minutes based on one of the cultural aspects under the "Investigación" section that comes with each movie. Students will provide instructor with a list of sources conform to MLA bibliographic standards and conventions. The rest of the class will take notes during these presentations and ask questions afterwards.

Because of the oral nature of this class these final oral evaluations count as the final exam and there will be no written.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS POLICY

Late work will not be accepted. Students will not be penalized for absences due to participation in University-approved activities, including athletic or scholastics teams, musical and theatrical performances, and debate activities. Students will be allowed to make up missed work without any reduction in their final course grade. Reasonable accommodation must also be made for students participating in a religious observance.

MAKE-UP POLICY FOR TESTS

Make-up policy of exams: As for the exams (Partial and Final) there is **no make-up** possibility. Exceptions include documented medical reason, religious accommodation, and official FAU athletic commitment, death in the family, or court appearance. If you know in advance of any such reason, please let me know. A grade of "C" or better is required for the course to count for the major or the minor.

Incomplete Grade Policy

The University policy states that a student who is passing a course but has not completed all work due to exceptional circumstances, may, with consent of the instructor, temporarily receive a grade of incomplete ("I"). The assignment of the "I" grade is at the discretion of the instructor but is allowed only if the student is passing the course.
