Course Description

This course introduces artificial intelligence methods within the field of cybersecurity. Students will learn how supervised learning, unsupervised learning, and big data, are applied in practice to relevant various cybersecurity, including in characterizing cyber-attacks, malware and intrusion detection, and threat modeling. Importance of fairness, transparency, and explainability in cybersecurity machine learning models will be highlighted.

Instructional Method

In-Person. There is no remote option for this course.

Prerequisites

COP 3410 or COP 3530 With a minimum grade of C

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

This class is designated as “In-Person w/Recorded Lecture” (section XXX) or “Videotaped Class” (section YYY).
