

Course Description

In this course, students will learn about the creative ideas and accomplishments of various cultures in various fields of humanities that may include art, architecture, drama, history, music, literature, philosophy, and religion. The course will include cultural expressions from the Western canon and may also include expressions from around the globe.

Honors Course: This course offers a broad introduction to the humanities through philosophy, history, and literature. The class will function like a facilitated book club: students will read assigned books and articles at home, and I will lead the class through discussion and provide background information. Key topics explored: What does it mean to be a hero? What is sacrifice? What makes a good leader? How should our mortality affect our actions? What is a good life? What is the relationship between science and art? What are the ways in which knowledge and technology can be harmful and beneficial? What are myths, and why do we tell them? In addition to exploring these themes, students will learn about past cultures, as well as major historical and cultural movements.

Instructional Method

In-Person. There is no remote option for this course.

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will demonstrate knowledge of arts and ideas and synthesize information from various sources.
- 2. Students will analyze and interpret selected expressions of arts and ideas.
- 3. Students will compare and contrast selected expressions of arts and ideas.
- 4. Students will identify contextual influences on the development of interdisciplinary arts and ideas.

Course Evaluation Method

- a) Participation 10%
- b) Ouizzes 40% (8 at 5% each)
- c) Project 50% (2 at 25% each)

In Class Participation

Students are expected to attend every class and to actively participate (i.e. says something at least once a week). Missing classes, being disrespectful, or not participating will detract from your

overall participation grade. Each class missed will result in a reduction of 1% of your total participation grade. If students must miss class, they are required to notify me beforehand, unless it is an emergency.

Quizzes

There will be eight short quizzes that test your understanding of the readings. The quizzes will be a few questions and will be short answer format.

Projects

Students will have to submit two research projects, one of which may be submitted with another person. The project should include a 5-6 double-spaced research paper and an ancillary visual component. The goal of the project is to offer a more in-depth analysis of a theme, author, or text examined in the reading. The visual component should complement the research paper.
