Re: Creation of Caribbean and Latin American Studies Minor

Dear Colleagues,

As Director of the Certificate of Caribbean and Latin American Studies, I write to you in your capacity as Department Chair to request your support for a proposal to create a minor of Caribbean and Latin American Studies to complement the existing CLAS Certificate.

The benefits of adding a minor to FAU's degree offerings are multiple: first, the creation of a minor will attract broader enrollment from a pool of students more likely to declare a minor than a certificate. For various reasons, including financial aid, challenges with academic advising, limited opportunity to advertise certificates to students across majors, and the inability to declare a CLAS certificate (in contrast to a minor), some students are dissuaded from participating in the certificate. Creating a minor not only ensures an increased number of participants in the program but indeed promises to bring more students into the full range of courses identified as qualifying electives: these elective courses presently include the ones listed in the affixed minor requirements proposal on the last page of this letter.

Naturally, course content related to Caribbean and Latin American Studies is of high relevance to our geographic region and even more so to our institution, which is designated as a Hispanic Serving Institution by the United States Department of Education. As such, each department that offers courses creditable as electives towards the minor will stand to gain enrollment from a specific subset of students with a pointed interest in the subject matter. With the increased enrollment it is likely to bring to courses thematically pertinent to the Caribbean and Latin America, there will likely be demand for new courses on related subject matter and the opportunity for departments to grow their offers in this area.

Moreover, this shift will allow FAU's degree offerings to better parallel those of its regional public institution counterparts, including Nova Southeastern University (which offers a minor), FIU (which offers a major in Latin American and Caribbean Studies), UCF (which offers a major in Latin American Studies as well as a Minor in Latin American, Caribbean and Latinx Studies). The list of public Florida universities offering a major and minor in Latin American Studies or Latin American and Caribbean Studies also includes FSU and UF.

Ultimately, by adding a minor in Caribbean and Latin American Studies to FAU's existing offering of a Certificate in Caribbean and Latin American Studies, our university will be able to better serve distinct populations by catering to undergraduate students with the minor, and to non-degree-seeking students with the certificate. The whole institution stands to benefit from such an addition: participating departments will likely see increased course enrollment at the 3000 and 4000 levels, new funding opportunities may become available, and our students will benefit from a competitive academic transcript.

For the time present, the prospective minor would be overseen by the Americas Initiative, with the possibility of eventually being housed within the new Global Studies program here at FAU. The creation of the minor as an addition to the existing certificate is a measure for which Arts & Letters Dean Michael Horswell has already shown his support, as has Americas Initiative Director Alejandra Aguilar. I hope you will give this proposal your fullest consideration.

Affixed to the end of this letter, please find an overview of the proposed minor requirements. I ask you to review them carefully and encourage you to provide feedback should you feel so inclined.

If you wish to discuss the proposed minor, I would be delighted to do so either virtually or in person.

Caribbean and Latin American Studies Minor (15 credits)

The School of Interdisciplinary Studies offers a minor in Caribbean and Latin American Studies available to all undergraduate students. The minor requires a minimum of 15 credits, 9 of which must be in upper-level classes (3000 level and above). At least 75 percent of all credits must be earned from FAU.

A grade of "C" or better in each course is required for successful satisfaction of core and elective courses. No more than six (6) credit hours from any department can be used toward the minor. No more than six (6) credit hours of overlap between a student's major program and CLAS minor is permitted. Additional courses not listed below may be substitutes with prior approval from the Program Director.
