1. Participation—10 points

- (2 pts) Complete the syllabus quiz
- (2 pts) Introduce yourself to the class. Include:
 - o Name/nickname
 - What do you think public health means? Personal or professional experience with public health (HINT: We have all encountered public health in our lives).
 - What interested you in this course?
- (3 pts) Briefly present in class recent news concerning a public health issue. The news taken from a reputable source. Examples of reputable sources are major network news outlets like CNN and newspapers like New York Times or the Miami Herald. Blogs, Wikipedia, or sources/editorials that do not substantiate their news cannot be included. Please report news and include your own brief (1 page), well-conceived commentary about the public health issue.
- (3 pts) Provide substantive commentary on at least three other student News posts. Indicate that you have read the article posted and their summary; provide your thoughts, external links, resources, and other feedback. Feel free to ask the student questions.
- (5 pts) Provide substantive commentary on at least three other poster presentations. Commentary should evidence that you have fully viewed the presentation.

*WHAT DO I MEAN BY "SUBSTANTIVE?"

This means that they add to the discussion, carry it forward, and contribute new and meaningful content to the direction of the 'conversation'. Do not simply restate the thoughts of another student, or just say that you agree with what has been said. Your own words, not taken directly from the abstract or body of an article, or the wording from a web site, text, report or other source are part of the requirement for a discussion post entry.



2. Homework – 10 points (two points each)

• Homework will be assigned for select units.

3. Health Promotion Poster Presentation—10 points

• Student groups will complete a two part project: 1) A brochure or poster that you would design as part of a public education/awareness campaign; and 2) A 4-slide analysis of this public health problem. The presentation must be narrated. Slides should be uncluttered and simple. Narrator should not read directly from slides, but should explain what the viewer is seeing.

Order of Slides:

- 1. A Poster or brochure appealing to a target audience to raise awareness of a public health problem. The poster or brochure should seek to promote health behavior changes.
- 2. Background of the problem (epidemiological data: incidence, prevalence)
- 3. Risk factors of the problem
- 4. Target population (who do you want to reach with this poster and why)
- 5. List of references (cite references in the slides)

4. Research Paper—25 points

- Students will select a public health issue and write a 5 page, double-spaced research paper. The papers must address:
 - o Definition and history of the problem
 - Current epidemiology of the public health problem (Who, where, prevalence, incidence, etc.)
 - o Determinants of the problem
 - o Interventions that have been implemented and their effectiveness
- AT LEAST 5 reputable references/citations in APA style are required.

5. Two Exams—20 points each

Students will be given two timed tests composed of multiple choice, short answer, and matching questions. Each exam is offered for three days and once you have begun you cannot pause/stop and restart later. While course materials are available to you, there will be little time to look up answers (usually 1-2 minutes per question) so use your time very wisely. Make-ups will be granted only in the case of major, documented emergencies (e.g., death of first-degree relative, student hospitalization, etc.). The student must notify the instructor on the day the emergency occurs. Vacations are not emergencies. The instructor reserves the right to give a make-up exam consisting entirely of essay questions.



Requirements for all written assignments

- Double spaced in 12 point font
- Standard 1" margins
- APA format standards (FAU policy dictates that all written material complies with APA standards. (See Additional required materials). Cite any sources of information in APA style format (including videos and websites).
- For APA Style Help: http://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/560/01/
- Avoid using quotes unless the text must remain true to its original wording or the quote is from a renowned person.
- Your points/ideas in your paper should be unified, substantive, and cohesive (each paragraph fully develops an idea; each idea relates logically to the next).
- Your papers are carefully edited to eliminate sentence clutter (unnecessary phrases, clauses, passive verbs).
- Your papers are free of spelling, grammar and punctuation errors.

Papers are graded on:

- Quality and clarity of the overall paper, ability to convey a compelling thesis, logical flow-of-thought
- Research and content; lack of redundancy; accuracy
- Citations and references; APA style
 - Most sources must be peer reviewed scholarly journal articles; newspaper articles are acceptable. Wikipedia is not an acceptable resource. You must cite the ORIGINAL source of information.
 - o Some online resources (e.g. government, Kaiser Family Foundation, CDC reports) are acceptable.
- Grammar and spelling
