Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Implement Spanish-language vocabulary related to film to discuss Latin American films.
- Interpret themes, plot, and symbolism observed in each film watched in class.
- Describe the plot and main themes of Latin American films and introduce film directors to an audience in Spanish.
- Compare and contrast themes, plot, and symbolisms of several Latin American films in Spanish.
- Design a small Latin American film festival for their final projects.

Assignments will not be accepted via email. A 5 point (penalty) will be deducted from the assignment grade for each late day after the due date (uploaded to Canvas). For example: if you earn an 88, and the assignment is two days late, your final grade for that assignment will be 78.
