Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

After the course, the students will be proficient with standard beat patterns, including mixed meters, and develop the ability to cue entrances, show releases, and indicate musical expressivity with the left hand. They will understand performance indications in multiple languages and incorporate them into performance preparation and begin to develop a fluid conducting technique that demonstrates varying articulations, dynamic levels, tempos, and preparatory gestures connected to breathing. The students will also begin to recognize inaccurate pitches and rhythms and learn how to correct them with appropriate rehearsal methods, including the ability to give clear and concise verbal instructions, maximize limited rehearsal time, indicate style and interpretation through gesture, and cultivate a discerning ear.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Summarize the impact of major composers and their works (CO 1)
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of a score through conducting (CO 2)
- 3. Compare scores from various genre and era (CO 3)
- 4. Critique self-performance (CO 4)
- 5. Organize and prepare choral repertoire for performance (CO 5)
- 6. Create appropriate gestures related to the score and ensemble needs (CO 6)
- 7. Identify and state principles of performance practice (CO 7)
- 8. Describe, compare, and discuss changes in choral repertoire throughout historical era (CO 8)

- 9. Summarize the impact of major composers and their works (CO 9)
- 10. Apply performance practice and historical study to the conducting of choral works (CO 10)

(CO = Course Objective)

Course Evaluation Method

Grading Criteria

- 1. Participation and Preparation- students will be graded daily for their level of class participation. This includes the readiness to discuss or conduct, knowledge of the score, and physical preparedness.
- 2. Written Assignments- These will include, but are not limited to, Discussion Board posts, Article Annotations, and a formal essay on a specific work.
- 3. Score Studies- For each assigned score, students will submit an analytical score study. A complete analysis contains composer research, translation, analysis, and a marked score unless otherwise specified. Examples are found on Canvas and a rubric is posted
- 4. Conducting Tests- There will be five (5) conducting tests on assigned literature. Score studies for each piece of literature submitted are graded in the Score Studies section. All videos must be submitted using YouTube or Vimeo Links.
- 5. Final Exam- The Final exam will be on two pieces that should assess your skills in conducting, interpretation, and analysis. A complete score study will be submitted.
- 6. Video Self-Evaluations- Students will submit a self-evaluation for each of the 5 conducting tests.

ACDA Membership: By the end of the second week of classes, Students must show documentation of an active student membership in the organization to acquire materials and references. Students are encouraged to participate in this organization, though participation is not mandated.

In the case of a possible extra credit assignment, the amount that could have been added will be taken away from the final grade.

If such a situation should occur, the student should contact the instructor prior to the start of the performance and should be in EXTREME cases only. Should this occur, the student will be required to complete the course the next time it is offered as no make up for a collaborative performance is possible or reasonable.
